Knock - A place of blessing



The recent visit of President Joe Biden to the shrine of Our Lady of Knock drew a great deal of publicity both nationally and internationally. President Biden is only the second Roman Catholic in history to hold the highest office in the USA.

He has spoken often of the importance of his faith and is 'not behind the door' in acknowledging its importance in his life.

Although the visit to Knock was an entirely private one, it was obvious that it was an intensely important and meaningful moment for him on his 'homecoming' trip to Ireland as President.

A happy reunion

Fr. Frank O'Grady is an Irish born retired US Army Chaplain who is presently resident in Knock assisting with Masses and Confessions. On the day before the visit, he casually mentioned to the rector of the shrine Fr. Richard Gibbons, that he had been the Chaplain at the military hospital when President Biden's son Beau had died some eight years ago, and had ministered the Sacraments to him. On learning this, Fr. Gibbons then arranged for Fr. O'Grady to be present in the apparition chapel when the President visited.

It seems that the encounter proved deeply moving for the President who remembered Fr. Frank well, and he spent some ten minutes in conversation with him together with his sister Valerie and his son Hunter. Fr. O'Grady described the meeting as "like a reunion".

Later that evening, during his speech in Ballina, President Biden made reference to the meeting and spoke of how he took the encounter "as a sign".



Whatever about the importance of a Presidential visit to Knock, it was good to know that a still grieving father had found some solace at a place where so many others have been blessed.

MABS – the Money Advice and Budgeting Service is the State's money advice service, guiding people through dealing with problem debt for over 20 years. MABS phone service is open Monday to Friday 9 am to 8 pm on 0818 07 2000.

What is the European Health Insurance Card?

The European Health Insurance Card (EHIC) allows you to access public healthcare in another EU/EEA state for free or at a reduced rate. You can use it when you are travelling abroad or when you are staying temporarily in another EU State.

Essential points about the card:

Each family member needs their own card.

It lasts for up to 4 years.

You will need to apply to renew your card and you can renew online.

When abroad, always carry your EHIC with you. It will not cover you for healthcare outside of the EU, other than Iceland, Norway and Liechtenstein (EEA) and Switzerland.

It does not cover private healthcare. It used to be called the E111 form.

You can apply:

In person: at any local health office except, Dublin North West, Dublin South, Kildare and West Wicklow.

By post: Print out an application form and post it to your local health office along with any documents required.

Online: Apply through the HSE website if you have a medical card or drug payment scheme card and you live in Ireland.

Can I get a European Health Insurance Card? You can only apply for a European Health Insurance Card: If you live in Ireland If you live in another European Union (EU), European Economic Area (EEA) member state, or Switzerland

If you live in Ireland but you are linked to another EU/EEA State's Social Security System, contact the health authorities in that country for more information.

If you live in Northern Ireland but are employed in Ireland, you can get an Irish-issued EHIC.

Frontier workers (or cross-border workers) can get an Irish-issued EHIC because they make social security contributions in Ireland. They must return home at least once a week to qualify.

Student dependants of frontier workers can get an Irish-issued EHIC. They must be aged 18 to 23 years, studying in the EU/EEA or Switzerland and have a completed School or College Details form. If you live in another EU/EEA member state or Switzerland

If you live in the EU, EEA or Switzerland, you are entitled to an Irish-issued EHIC if any of the following apply.

You receive a state pension from Ireland and have an Irish-issued E Form/S1 form (certificate of entitlement) registered in your country of residence. You work for an Irish employer and are posted to work in another EU/EEA country or Switzerland. You are a frontier worker (cross-border worker) living in the EU/EEA and working in Ireland. You are a family member of a posted worker of someone working in Ireland, and you are not covered in your own right by the EU/EEA country you live in.

If you are resident in another EU/EEA member state, you will need to complete a different application form online, by email or by post. If you are not eligible for an Irish-issued EHIC, you should see if you are eligible for an EHIC in the country you are currently living in.

Where can I use it? You can use your European Health Insurance Card in any European Union or European Economic Area (EEA) country and in Switzerland. Currently, the EEA comprises of the 27 member states of the European Union together with Iceland. Norway, and Liechtenstein.

As Andorra and Monaco are not part of the EU or EEA, your EHIC is not accepted there. You should get private health insurance instead.

Find out where you can use your EHIC and how to access healthcare abroad, on the HSE website. *UK:* If you are an Irish citizen, you have access to healthcare under the Common Travel Area while visiting the UK. However, other EU citizens should continue to use the EHIC, which is still accepted in the UK

Outside the EU: If you are travelling outside the EU/EEA, you should get private health insurance instead.










Lucan Toastmasters

Here is a list of those buried in the Vesey/ Colthurst family graveyard in the old Church ruins in the grounds of Lucan House and also some history.

Charlotte Sarsfield the last of the Sarsfields to live in the old castle married Agmondisham (Agm) Vesey in or around 1690s. Charlotte died in late 1690s. Charlotte is more than likely buried in the grounds or the old graveyard back of the Lucan Inn.

She had 2 daughters Henrietta (married Caesar Colclough of Tintern Abbey Wexford) and Ann (married Sir John Bingham Castlebar). Ann's granddaughter Lavina Bingham married the 2nd Earl Spencer and thus Agm Snr and Charlotte are the 6th Great Grandparents of Princess Diana. Agm remarried Lady Jane Butler and had 6 children, the eldest named also Agm.

Burials as follows:

Agm Vesey Snr died 23rd March 1738. His wife **Jane** 1746.

Nicholas Colthurst born 29th Sept 1820, died 10th Nov1820. (born in Lucan House) (first son of Sir Nicholas Colthurst and Elizabeth Vesey married in 1819 in Lucan House)

Col George Vesey (nephew of Agm) died 11th April 1836 and his wife Emily died 12th Jan 1854.

Col. Vesey's mother and father **George** and **Letitia** are also buried in this grave.

William Lumsden died 23rd Mar 1867 and his wife Celia died 25th Apr 1877. William was land Steward and worked for over 30 years Colthursts.

Emily Roblastre died 29th Mar 1880(may have been close friend)

Charles Colthurst Vesey died 11th May 1885 and his wife Annie died 19th Mar 1911.


Charles Colthurst Vesey (son of the above) died 28th Dec 1915. (He was a bachelor)

The last Colthurst Vesey (Edward) died 1917 in Manchester and is buried there.

All can be seen on Sat 9th September during the Lucan Festival.

A Convent old and new.....

Back in 1977, the late Sr. John Bosco penned a little history book on Lucan. Gleaned mainly from pieces in Lucan Newsletter, the title was *Lucan Old and New*. Well, if she were here today, she'd have great material for another book, following the refurbishment which has been carried out at the Presentation Mission House.

Formerly the 32nd Presentation Convent, founded in 1867, the building has been catapulted into the 21st century. It really has been turned inside out and upside down, and gone are the somewhat dark and gloomy corridors and rooms. With all rooms ensuite, and a newly installed lift, residents, many of whom have worked abroad for most of their lives, can look forward to comfortable days in Lucan.

The old kitchen area is now the dining room, and the parlours which many of us would have visited in former years, have been spruced up and are looking splendid.

The former oratory now houses a suite of offices, while a comfortable chapel located upstairs in a more central part of the building, is furnished with some beautiful craftwork.

But something very old caught my eye. Just beside a staircase is a very old bell on a wooden frame. This I believe to be the bell from penal times, when Mass was celebrated in a wooden



building, possibly on the site of the present Garda Station or the School House – maps vary from these times. I've never seen this bell before, but knew it was in the convent building. What a treasure!

While the old archives have been moved to the Nano Nagle Place in Cork for safe keeping, it's nice that a building with such an interesting history, has retained this important piece here in Lucan.

Many parishioners had the pleasure of visiting the new building on Wednesday last, and most were toying with the idea of putting their names down for a place there (even the menfolk)!!!

We congratulate the Sisters, and wish them every happiness in their 'new' home!

Basketball: Congratulations to our 2nd yr basketball team who advanced to the All-Ireland Junior Boys "B" semi-finals after three wins from three at the National play-offs held in Bettystown last Thursday. The team beat Coláiste na hInse, Laytown 31-25 in their opening game with Noah Dolan, Aaron McCormack and Lewis Adjinakou scoring most of the team's points.

The team then took on St. Mary's Christian Brother Grammar School, Belfast in their next game. A dominant 1st 1-4 display saw Lucan open up an unassailable 23-5 lead, with Lewis and Aaron scoring 21 of the points between them. The outcome was never in doubt after this blistering start and Lucan cruised to a comfortable victory with Lewis (7), Cian Kelly (6), Ciarán O' Sullivan (4), Aaron (2) and Páidí Murphy (2) adding further scores as the team won 45-26 to claim their 2nd win of the day.

The team had very little time to rest as they were straight back on court just minutes later to take on St. Aidan's from Cork in what was a winnertakes-all encounter. Aidan's edged 11-8 ahead in the 1st 1-4. They extended their lead slightly in the 2nd 1-4 to open a 5 point lead (22-17) with Aaron McCormack scoring all 9 points for Lucan in this period. Aaron continued his phenomenal run of scoring in the 3rd 1-4 as he scored another 4 baskets while Ciarán O' Sullivan also scored as Lucan edged in front for the 1st time 27-26. MALAWI

Way back at Easter 2005, we headed off to this strange land, which I had only heard of on BBC radio in my young days. It was then called Nyasaland.

West Roscommon was poor back then, but we at least had a lovely clean, protected, spring well, looked after by my grandfather. So what impacted me most on that visit to Malawi was the lack of access to clean drinking water.

And so began Wells for Zoe.

Looking at the world of development – the money spent, the strategic planning, the missions and visions that are written about – we had to consider how we might approach this. We knew our limitations and knew that we needed keep it simple and pay all the expenses ourselves.

Mary was doing a thesis for Trinity and somehow I spotted and remembered the development ideals of a Chinese philosopher Lao Tzu (600 BC-531 BC, founder of Taoism: Go to the people. Live with them. Learn from them. Love them. Start with what they know. Build with what they have. But when the work is done, enable the people to say we have done this ourselves.

Having come from two small farms in the West of Ireland, we fully appreciated the value of hard work and education and, in reality, had no difficulty slotting into the poor rural environment that this mad adventure has placed us, with the poorest of the poor, subsistence farmers; God's own people like the people who made us what *we* are.

After a long search I eventually located, what I considered a suitable pump, designed by an amazing man called Richard Cansdale outside Newcastle in the UK. He helped to get us going and manufacturing it in Mzuzu, Northern Malawi. After many modifications and changes, over the years, it's still going strong and manufactured by Malawians who learned on the job. It's main valve now being manufactured from recycled plastic potting tubes, by Chrissie, who came to us as a cook and has learned to do this computerized manufacturing magic. They learn from us and each other.

Our faith and belief in the women (and men too) of Malawi continues to inspire and propel us into more and more remarkable expeditions.

Pumps and clean water continues to be our big focus where the, ever increasing, population is now over 21 million.

Reforestation and soil restoration is a big part of our overall project now. The World needs trees so the funding from big corporations, helping with climate change, enabled us to plant about 7 million trees this year, employing about 1,700 workers, 80% of whom are women (who never got paid before), but also

assists with many necessary community development projects

Preschools is one of our earliest projects but last year we decided to pay the carers and ask the community to donate a hectare of land to grow food for the kids and also use these as demonstration plots showing how to grow crops without chemical fertilizer or chemical pesticides.

Rural Clinics: With the enormous success of Kadakechi Clinic, we are discussing the possibility of five more remote rural clinics with the Ministry. Again they will provide all the meds and we will provide the transport and pay the nurses and later hopefully add a counselling service

Self Help Groups: We are at the very early stage of setting up women's self help groups, where maybe up to 20 women form a cooperative like set up where they save and pool their little money, coming together weekly, lend to each other, do little businesses and improve their lives. In the first areas it looks like the chiefs will allocate whatever land is needed where they can grow food for sale. The idea came from India originally, has rules and structures and has great potential

Sewing: Our girl-child project is one where we pay school fees for the poorest girls who qualify to attend secondary school and later if the qualify for third level. This year we have 282 in secondary and 36 in third level. We also have courses on horticulture, forestry and our runaway success is in the training of girls to use four singer sewing machines.

Most of our funding comes as a result of the positive impact we have on the Global environment, but just now I have an ask.

Many are now starving in Malawi, mostly because they can't afford fertilizer and chemical pesticides, but we have a system requiring neither.

BUT we are looking for seeds that are not genetically modified to demonstrate, grow and multiply. We have been promised some from Seedsavers in Scarrif and more from Fruit Hill Farms in Cork.

We will take local, out of date and in fact anything with possibilities, in brown envelopes, plastic bags or left overs, to try and grow model gardens everywhere, to be copied



St. Mary's Camera Soirée









Perhaps the most interesting photograph on the subject of machinery is the one submitted by Rose of the remains of the Pumping machinery of the Lucan Spa Hotel.

The website of the Lucan Spa Hotel (www.lucanspahotel.ie/hotel-history) gives a fascinating history of the origins of the hotel and of the spa. In summary, according to that site, a natural iron spa was founded in 1758 and in 1795 the original hotel, now the County Bar, was built. The present hotel was built in 1891 and by the late 1910s/early 1920s, the hotel added a spa/baths room, where the water from the natural iron spa was pumped at high pressure to a room known as



the Pump Room in the hotel allowing guests to enjoy a number of spa treatments. The Pump Room is now the location of the hotel's Boyne Suite. Rose's photo is of part of the machinery used to pump the water to the hotel.

Incidentally, the term Spa is derived from the name of the town of Spa, Belgium whose name is known from Roman times, and which is still famous today for its mineral springs.
