The ongoing unfolding of the horrors in both Gaza and Ukraine cast a long shadow over our Christmas celebrations 2023. The fact that the land of the Lord's birth is in such turmoil, and so many innocents are suffering there, gives us all pause for thought.

The barbaric attack of Hamas on innocent Israelis has brought about a degree of retaliation so disproportionate, and of such ferocity, that it causes revulsion throughout the world. At the

present rate of destruction there will be little left of Gaza in a short time. Estimates of the dead range from 10,000 to 18,500, and many of these have been women and children. We have all seen the deeply upsetting new reports, showing blood covered children crying out in despair, and the distraught parents cradling the bodies of their dead children.

The initial scenes from Israel, of the brutal Hamas attack were equally horrific, and we all shared the pain of the families of the murdered, the wounded and the kidnapped. These atrocities were the work of terrorists, lawless butchers, intent on inflicting pain. What we are witnessing now in Gaza are the actions of an elected government. Elected governments are expected to act, and react, in a civilized way, according to the rule of law, never attacking the innocent, that is what makes what we are witnessing so impossible to understand, and so utterly reprehensible.

The Director General of the United Nations Antonio Gutteres has said "the situation is fast deteriorating into a catastrophe with potentially irreversible implications for Palestinians as a whole and for peace and security in the region". The General Assembly of the UN has voted by a majority of 153 nations to call for an immediate humanitarian ceasefire; – this has been vetoed by Israel's powerful political allies. The UN now seems to have run out of options, its resolution is non-binding, and the general assembly seems impotent.

Russia is stepping up it's attacks on Ukraine, with Tuesday nights attacks on Kiev damaging a children's hospital and leaving dozens of dead in their homes; this looks to be a conflict that will go on and on.

It's difficult to celebrate 'Peace on earth, goodwill to all" – the beautiful message of the saviour's birth, when so much suffering continues to be inflicted, and innocents are slaughtered. We really need to pray in these final days of Advent, that somehow peace can prevail, that the horrors of war will come to an end.

## Becoming an Irish citizen through naturalisation?

Naturalisation is when you become a citizen of another country, usually because you have been living there for a number of years. To apply for naturalisation in Ireland, you must be physically resident in Ireland for a certain length of time.

You can also read about: Citizenship by birth or descent Citizenship through the Foreign Births Register

All applications to become a naturalised Irish citizen are decided by Immigration Service Delivery (ISD) on behalf of the Minister for Justice. The Minister has absolute discretion as to whether or not to grant naturalisation. The Minister considers a range of information available to decide on an application for naturalisation.

You apply online for Irish citizenship. If you have already submitted a paper form, you can continue to submit documentation by post.

Paper forms continue to be available to those who cannot access an online service. To request a paper form contact citizenshipinfo@justice.ie

There is an application fee of €175. If your application is successful, you may have to pay a further fee of up to €950 (see 'Certification fees' on our website for exceptions to this fee).



## **Lucan Planning Council**

An update on our door-to-door petition to get the NTA to engage with us to address the bus and traffic problems:

We continue to get overwhelming support on the doors as we proceed to get the views of the greater Lucan population. We are doing an in person petition to ensure we get as many viewpoints as possible. Due to the recent bad weather we have not as yet completed the callbacks due to people being out when we called.

The main concern is Lucan will be choked with traffic within a few years if nothing is done. Public transport has been removed as an option for many due to intransigence of NTA and we intend raising this as it contradicts government policy.

We postponed our on the street public meeting due to the cold spell and will reschedule. On foot of informing the Junior Minister Jack Chambers of the extent of our door to door activity, he has requested a meeting. This should happen in January.

It has become clear that Minister Eamon Ryan is focused on climate action and we question his attention to detail on Public Transport in Ireland. We will raise this.

Castleknock took the lead for the 3<sup>rd</sup> time in the match soon after but Tyler Doherty equalised from the spot late on for Lucan to secure top spot in the group a home match against Adamstown CS in the Dublin West Regional semi-final.

Our **u17 team** failed to qualify for the knockout stages of the League after agonisingly losing out on goals scored. Despite winning two of their three games, the team finished in 3<sup>rd</sup> place in the group after suffering a 9-3 defeat to Castleknock CC on Friday. An understrength Lucan, missing some key Transition Year players who were on work experience, struggled to deal with the lively and talented Castleknock forwards throughout the game. Eoin Maher (2) and Will Smith scored the Lucan goals but unluckily they are only team in the entire competition to have won two games in the group stages and not qualify for the next round in January.



**Badminton:** Coláiste Phádraig's Badminton Club is going from strength to strength with good numbers attending training in the Sports Hall every Wednesday after school. The training sessions go on for 90minutes and the more experienced senior players generously give of their time to coach the younger, inexperienced players. Rohit Tummala, Joel Emmanuel, Abhinav and Aniruddh Sriram have been guiding and advising the 1<sup>st</sup> yr players in particular, teaching them the basics such as hand grip, footwork, serving, stance, drop shots and the very popular smash shots!

**PE:** Our 6<sup>th</sup> vr PE students have been working overtime in recent weeks on their PAP (Physical Activity Project), which is one of three assessment components of the Leaving Cert PE course and worth 20% of the overall marks. The students had to select an activity from any competitive sport and they had the choice of competing the project as a performer, coach or choreographer. They could choose from a wide range of activities such as orienteering, rockclimbing, canoeing, life-saving, water-polo, gym work, aerobics, gymnastics or any of the main sports that young people participate in. The students must complete the PAP in the official State Examinations Booklet and submit it digitally in a folder by the end of this week. They must include three videos of themselves as well so it is a really hands-on, practical project that they must take full responsibility for. The videos are to be annotated with voiceovers and/or subtitles as this is important for identifying which of the 4 distinct performance goals (chosen by each student) the video footage pertains to. A number of the students chose gym work for their project and they were in the school gym after school over the past week putting the finishing touches to their work. The students will next complete a performance assessment (worth a further 30% of the overall marks) before sitting the written exam in the summer (which is worth the remaining 50% of marks).

Christmas Service: St. Mary's Church, Lucan hosted a heart-warming Christmas service for our 2<sup>nd</sup> yr students on Tuesday morning. The occasion brought together students of diverse faiths and beliefs and, under the guidance of Fr. Ubaldo, the service not only celebrated the spirit of Christmas but also helped foster a sense of community and belonging. There was an uplifting festive atmosphere at the service that resonated with joy and excitement thanks to the collective efforts that made the occasion memorable for everyone involved. We are very grateful to Fr. Ubaldo and the parish for their unwavering support and for creating a welcoming space for all to share in this festive season.

Hurling: Our senior hurlers were eliminated from the Dublin League after suffering a narrow defeat to Templeogue College on Monday. Killian Costello impressed with an excellent performance as he scored 2-06, including a lot of well-taken frees, while Patrick Ryan added a further 1-2. However, Lucan eventually lost 4-13 to 3-14 in an open and entertaining game with both teams looking for the win that would secure qualification to the next round.

## Weather Miscellany

## The Start of The Irish Meteorological Service.

The Irish Meteorological Service was established in December 1936. It took over the existing meteorological organization in Ireland from the British Met. Office. Transatlantic flights were planned to take off from Foynes, Co Limerick. It was felt necessary to expand the observational networks and set up a forecasting organization to

service the needs of Fovnes, Initially flying boats and other aircraft used the airport, to be followed by regular aircraft after World War



Two. Shannon Airport Weather Station was established in 1938 and followed by Dublin Airport in 1939. Already weather stations at Valentia (1866), Birr (1872) and Malin Head (1885) had been set up.

#### **Ireland's Oldest Weather Station**

Valentia Observatory is about 1 kilometre southwest of the town of Cahirciveen on the 'Ring of Kerry'. It was originally sited on Valentia Island (1866) but it was moved to the mainland in March 1892 to much improved accommodation. Valentia carried out the usual surface weather measurements: temperature, sunshine, rainfall and wind. In addition, it does upper-air measurements, ozone monitoring, geomagnetics, seismology, solar radiation and environmental monitoring. Valentia has a mild climate throughout the year which is influenced by The Gulf Stream and the prevailing west or south-west winds. Frost, when

it comes tends to occur in January and February. The average maximum temperature in winter is close to 10C. In summer it is close to 18C.



## 'The Troubles'

Brendan McWilliams describes in his book, "Weather Eye, The Final Year", an incident that took place one night in June 1921 during The War of Independence. Some armed men arrived at the observatory and requisitioned a theodolite and a telephone. This did not affect the daily routine as telegraphic communications were unaffected and normal weather reports continued to be issued. However, during The Civil War there was fighting in nearby Cahirciveen and telegraphic communications were interrupted for a time. But by mid-1923 Valentia Observatory's reporting

routine was back to normal and happily has continued ever since.

If you want to shelter from the rain don't pick an oak tree as it has many horizontal branches which release the rain fairly quickly on those seeking shelter. Branches that slope up to the sky make better umbrellas than horizontal ones. They channel the rain towards the trunk and away from those people under the tree. Poplar and beech are examples of trees to look out for as shelter during a heavy shower!

## Record Temperature on October 9, 2023.

On October 6 a heat dome approached Ireland

from Europe. It came over us and brought very high October temperatures to Ireland. This unusual spell of weather lasted from October 6 to October 10.



Phoenix Park Weather Station recorded 23C on October 9. This was its highest ever temperature for that month. The normal afternoon temperature for that time in October is 14C. From the 11th onwards the weather was very unsettled with above average rainfall. This was in complete contrast to the mini-Indian Summer we had early in the month! It's worth weather watching in these climate changing times.



## St. Mary's Camera Soirée

This week I begin with some more of Paddy's night-time photos of Dublin Zoo's "The Enchanted Zoo".









Joe got to Dublin Castle and sent in a photograph of the 18<sup>th</sup> century style Neapolitan Crib at the Chapel Royal. The contemporary artist Bruno Perchiazzi is the creator of the architectural setting of the crib in Dublin Castle. He is *one of the best-known representatives of the Neapolitan art of the Nativity Scene and* explains that there are four essential elements to a Neapolitan crib – the manger scene, the adoration of the Magi, the annunciation to the shepherds and surprisingly the tavern where all the dodgy people can be found!

The first crib in Naples was erected in 1340. It consisted simply of a cave, animals and holy figures. The inventor of the *Neapolitan* nativity scene was St Gaetano da Thiene. Encouraged by St Francis, he decided to go beyond the representation of the nativity alone. He gave more significant value to the rest of the scene, filling it with characters and places that mixed the sacred and the profane.

The present chapel was opened on Christmas Day 1814. It became known as the Chapel Royal after



King George IV attended service there on 2 September 1821. The chapel was designed by Francis Johnston who also designed the GPO on O'Connell Street.
