It never ceases to amaze me, the enormous lengths people will go to in order to be with family at Christmas. Airports all over the world will bulge at the seams, and ferries will be choc-a- bloc. Joyful airport scenes of tearful embraces will be shown on news bulletins in the days before Christmas.

The recent storm damage at Holyhead port has jeopardised the prospects of thousands of Irish people, who may not now make it home for the big day, disappointment looms.

It's almost as if there is something at the heart of Christmas that triggers an inbuilt homing mechanism in the human psyche, a yearning to be with family and loved ones.

When you consider the reality that lies at the heart of Christmas; the reaching out of our creator to come among us, and make his home in our midst, it's hardly surprising that our response is a kind of echoing of God's reaching out in love.

In coming among us, Jesus has chosen us as his family, and has created a bond between and among us, that has fundamentally defined who we are, members of God's own family.

At Christmas time even the 'unchurched' find themselves drifting towards Mass. Somewhere deep in the heart, the call to celebrate the bond of family with God is still managing to be heard. The flame of faith, once lit, never fully goes out.

A parish community is in effect a 'family of families' united under God, and our homing instinct will bring us together in our Father's house in great numbers at Christmas. If we keep focused on the one who gathers us, and his message of unconditional love, then the true meaning of the feast, in all its powerful simplicity can truly enrich our lives.

The commercialisation that surrounds Christmas can be overpowering leaving us financially and mentally drained. If we fix our eyes on the one who comes, we draw life from the very source of life himself and we will be greatly enriched.

I wish all our parishioners every joy and blessing of the season. Cherish the precious time with family in a spirit of gratitude to God, and I pray that the blessings of the Christ-child will be with you and your families at this wonderful season.

## Chapter 24 has some seasonal pieces.....

For about the twelve days of Christmas, no man could drive a cow to the hill because of aches in his back and bones; others had black shins; another man hobbling on one leg for a month, and much more besides.

There were two traditions linked to the games seasons in Ireland. Summer matches were played in the south, east and west while in the north winter competitions were the norm.

May Day and Halloween were the two most important festivals – the beginning of summer and of winter. The main festival occasions for games in Ireland were Christmas Day, New Year's Day, and May Day.

There was a long tradition linking hurling to the Christmas holidays. In 1496 Henry VII forbade games among tradesmen, slaves and servants but he omitted the Christmas holidays – games could be played at that time – and that law remained on the Statute Books until 1845 under the title, "The bill for maintaining artillery and the debarring of unlawful games".

We have found very little direct evidence about hurling at Christmas before the beginning of the 19<sup>th</sup> century in Ireland and most of it relates to the North of Ireland. The evidence we have dates from the period 1825 to 1835 - old memories relating to ancient customs that lived until 1798 when they were destroyed by the repression that followed the Rebellion at that time.

In Antrim a written record dated 1835 states: "Before 1798 the people here were given to recreation and social gatherings. They used to gather for a few days at Christmas and Easter, but, since the act of prohibiting public gatherings was passed in those troubled times, their appetite for pastimes has greatly declined".

James Boyle wrote about the parish of Finvoy, in September,1835: They have given up completely almost the forms of entertainment they were so given to, once upon a time, like dancing, common playing (a sort of hurling) at Christmas; ... they have given them up completely".

"We have no Patterns or Pattern Days", wrote Rev. Robt Tráil in Ballintroy in 1814; no special customs, apart from one big group of people who gathered on the strand in White Park to play "common" or "shinny" on Christmas Day or New Year's Day. There was hurling on Rathlin Island in 1835. "Dancing is the first form of entertainment, and a little common playing at Xmas."

Eoin Mac Neill could remember the making and preparation of the hurleys; and he hurled as a youngster in Glenarm, but he said "Christmas Day was for the free holders". He said: "On Christmas Day, the older men who used to hurl once – 40 or 50 a side played a game. When an old man in our place was asked to explain the placename "Shinny Hill" in in Baile an Mhadaidh in Carn Locha, Co. Antrim, he said, "That is where they used to play hurling on Christmas Day".

In Culdaff, Co. Donegal in 1866 "during the Christmas holidays they used to enjoy a game of "Kamman" and in the parish of Carndonagh around 1834 "boys used to drive a small wooden "craig" with a crooked stub they called a "common".

#### **Christmas Contests Outside of Ulster**

There were two big annual contests in Ennis, Co Clare – townlands playing one another on Stephen's Day and "chapel areas" playing each other on St. Patrick's Day. There were also contests on Christmas Day and on St. Stephen's Day in Mayo on fine plains. Older generations recalled watching these games until the year 1860. Daithí Ó hUaithne mentions Christmas contests further south in Connamara. He considered the event was a ritual of some sort.

Another account of Christmas games comes from Leap, Co. Cork where a storyteller claimed the game played was not "hurling" as southerners knew it; "they had no hurleys, but sticks with a sloped head. The "sliotar" (ball) they used, was a piece of wood, exactly as they had in the North.

There is evidence of a hurling contest in Cork "a kind of Christmas athletic hosting" before the birth of the GAA. This took place at <u>Tulach</u> <u>Riascaigh</u> between the Powers and the Morgans usually on St. Stephens Day.

It calls on the National Transport Authority (NTA) to take immediate steps to address issues raised by locals, including exploring temporary lighting solutions to ensure adequate visibility at the bus stop. Expediting plans to replace the existing shelter with one that meets modern accessibility and safety standards. Improving visibility by managing overgrown vegetation around the area. A formal letter will be sent to the NTA. I will keep residents updated on progress.

I want to extend my congratulations to Helen Farrell on her nomination onto South Dublin County Council as a co-op member. As an independent local councillor, I am delighted to warmly welcome Helen in her new role.

The bridge was designed by the Spanish architect, Santiago Calatrava Valls, who also designed the James Joyce Bridge which joins the South Keys to Blackhall Place. The Custom House
