Speed limits in Ireland *Has the speed limit changed?*

Many speed limits in Ireland will be reduced during 2025.

The first change took effect from 7 February 2025 and affects rural local roads:

The default speed limit on rural local roads reduced from 80km/h to 60km/h.

The rural speed limit sign indicates a limit of 60km/h from 7 February 2025. This sign is a white circle with five diagonal black lines with another plate that states, "Go Mall / Slow".

Later in 2025, more reductions to speed limits will be introduced:

The speed limit in 'urban cores' will drop to 30km/h (urban cores include built up areas, housing estates and town centres).

The speed limit on national secondary roads will reduce from 100km/h to 80km/h.

These changes are set out in the Road Traffic Act 2024.

Why are the speed limits changing?

Speed limits are being reduced in an effort to increase road safety in Ireland. The Road Safety

Authority (RSA) has published information about the rural speed limit changes on its website, rsa.ie.

Do speed limits apply to everyone?

Certain vehicles in Ireland have different speed limits – specifically vehicles that carry passengers (such as buses and coaches), vehicles greater than a certain weight (such as trucks), and vehicles that are pulling trailers.

Speed limits in Ireland do not apply to ambulances, fire brigade services or Garda vehicles being used during duty.

It is an offence for anyone to use a speed meter detector in any vehicle in Ireland. Importing, fitting and supplying speed meter detectors and jammers is also an offence.

What happens if I go over the speed limit?

If you drive over the speed limit, you will get 3 penalty points and a fixed charge fine of €160.

If you do not pay the fine within 28 days, it increases to \in 240. If you do not pay this within 28 days (56 days from the original fine notification date), you will be summonsed to court. If convicted, you could be fined up to \in 1,000 and receive up to 5 penalty points.

If you were not the driver of the vehicle, you must complete the relevant section on the notice and return it within 28 days of its issue.






On planning......

A ten-year old schoolgirl was killed instantly as she crossed the road from ballet class at the old Saint Andrews Primary School to the pedestrian entrance to Lucan Heights, where her mother waited to accompany her home. She died on the footpath at her mother's knees. She died at the very spot where it is now proposed to erect 17 apartments with access to and from the main road within yards of the busiest traffic-controlled junction in Lucan.

As a result of the tragedy, three actions were taken by the authorities:

Bus stops on both sides of the road were moved further from the traffic lights.

A protective railing was installed at the lights. Flashing warning lights were installed.

This information was withheld from the recent planning application. It is thus new relevant information. The planning application must be looked at again and I call on all politicians, especially those who contribute to the local parish-pump issues, to re-open the case.

Several questions remain unanswered. Why did

the planning inquiry ignore the safety aspect? Did they receive a copy of the original accident report and details of the resulting safety measures?

Did the planning authority take into account the massive changes in the area concerned? Since the tragedy there has been a massive increase in student numbers at the four schools in the immediate vicinity. There is a brand-new primary school. The girls' primary school has been extended and modernized and St. Jospeh's girls' secondary school has been massively enlarged. All of this within yards of this proposed development. The result is that hundreds of students of all ages converge on the traffic junction within yards of the offensive development.

That traffic from the proposed development should cross the footpath being used by hundreds of schoolchildren is the stuff of nightmares. The primary role of a responsible society is the protection of its children. We the residents of Lucan Heights take our responsibilities very seriously.

A story that began in Lucan and ended in Lismore, Australia......

Coming of the Sisters

(from an account by Maggie Sullivan, who was a schoolgirl in Lismore, back then)


"From as early as 1883, it would seem, Dean Doyle had mentioned the possibility of procuring a religious community for Lismore.....

"I have many recollections of his telling his people from the sanctuary of the results of his search. He used to say he did not mind how long was the wait, he would get them teachers of the highest order ... Only parents with children of school age or senior pupils of those days longing for their coming can understand the joy with which his message was hailed when at last he announced that a community of Presentation Sisters from 'Lucan by the leafy Liffey' would be in residence in Lismore by August, 1886.

The first thought was to furnish the convent then completed nearly two years. With that object in view a bazaar and cattle sale was held at Easter which realised the phenomenal sum of £750. The ladies of the parish were busy for the next few months furnishing and quipping their Australian home for the holy woe crossing the seas from Ireland's shores. There was a wonderful spirit of co-operation and the direction of the work fell principally to Mrs. Fegan the Misses Coglan, Crowley and Dean, and on Mesdames Dean, Sexton McIntyre, McDonough, Dawson and M. F. McNamara ... no home was more lovingly prepared for a bride..."

"Everything was in readiness for more than a week before the sisters arrived. The Richmond was under flood and Miss Coglan with Miss E. Sullivan, then only a child, waited at the convent to receive the future occupants. At last, on 6th August, 1886, the flood waters having subsided, the old steamer 'Coraki' tied up at the Government Wharf early enough for the much-travelled ones to have breakfast under their own roof-tree. The Catholic community was almost delirious with joy and showered every gift in its power

at the portals of the convent. It hadn't much money in those days but its larders and pantries and poultry yards were levied to a lavish degree. Even several milch cows were among the gifts. How primitive were the community and district may be imagined when it is stated that only a small proportion of the people had never seen a nun before."




SS 'Austral' on which the first sisters came to Australia in 1886



Steamers similar to SS 'Coraki', which took the sisters on the final leg of their long journey. On 9 June, 1886, Mother Mary Stanislaus Darcy, Mother Ignatius Barnewall, and Mother Berchmans Barnwell, aged respectively 36, 34, and 31, accompanied by eight postulants whose ages ranged from 16 to 22, departed from Lucan, Ireland.

Sailing from Southampton, they reached Sydney on 26 July and continued their journey to Lismore on the coastal steamer 'SS Coraki', arriving on 6 August. An official welcome took place on 15 August and the following day they began their mission of teaching.





In 1967, three sisters

from Lismore Convent made their way to Ireland for the Lucan centenary celebrations. In 1986, Sr. Patrick from the Lucan Convent made her way to Lismore when

the sisters celebrated their centenary.



For two years before the arrival of the sisters, the citizens of the Richmond River had made preparations. They built a two-storey timber building next to the church to serve as a Convent and boarding school. The builders reported, that there was accommodation for twelve nuns and twenty boarders.

Bishop Torreggiani directed the sisters to set up three schools in Lismore – Saint Marys College, Saint Carthage's Parochial School and a Middle School for junior "better class children". Middle Schools were the practice in private schools of the time – they did not suit Australia and the idea was abandoned some years later.

Since then, Presentation Schools spread all across the land to all corners of Australia. Just like in Ireland, religious vocations have fallen, and the sisters found it increasingly difficult to maintain the schools, leading to mostly lay staffing these days.


After browsing for a couple of hours I settled on four titles, they were;

(Open to those over 18 yrs)

Baptism Team:

Preparing families for the Baptism of the children and assisting at the Baptism Ceremony. (Open to those over 18 yrs)

Funeral Team:

Working with bereaved families to assist in the preparation of the Funeral Liturgy. Leading prayers for the deceased in the family / funeral home and in the crematorium or at the graveside.

(Open to those over 18 yrs)

Family Mass Group:

The 10.30am Mass in both parishes are aimed at young people and families. A small group of parents work in preparing the children for the prayers and readings at these Masses.

Church Cleaners:

Visitors to both Churches often comment on how well kept the churches are. In St Patrick's this is down to a small group of volunteers who give their time each week to keeping things spick and span.

Music Groups:

Both parishes are well served by several music groups that enhance our celebration of the Liturgy.

taking him to the new facility in Lucan – it's getting to the stage now that he'll be more likely to go with his pals if waiting much longer......

Demesne Wall – the cost of the recent work is mind-boggling! A total of €791,613 was spent, according to the national press, the amount included:

€12,300 for an emergency assessment of the damage and €16,000 for a report into the causes of the collapse; €47,000 was spent on a detailed design of the wall repair; and €35,000 was paid for the diversion of overhead ESB lines. A revised design for the project cost €23,000, while the contract for construction "using traditional materials and methods" cost €444,517. €168,000 was spent to incorporate added reinforcement of the structure. The cost of repairing the footpath on the Lucan Road was around €7,000, leaving nearly €39,000 spent on other bits.



St. Mary's Camera Soirée

The topic for photographs for the month of February is "Spring Flowers" and Brendan made his way to Altamont Garden last weekend. Th gardens are located about 9 km from Tullow on the Bunclody Road. Planted by generations





of owner-gardeners, Altamont contains a collection of trees dating from 1750 to the present day and there are many fine examples of trees, shrubs, herbaceous plants and bulbs. Brendan sent us some 27 of the photos he took for us to choose from!





Nearer to home Conor also submitted photos of wild daffodils and white and violet Crocus in Lucan Demesne. The mushroom craze has started again with Conor submitting a photo Tubaria Furfuracea, commonly known as the scurfy twigle. The species is considered inedible!

Conor captured some Bottlenose dolphin swimming off Dun Laoghaire pier. He says that while they are not rare in Dublin Bay they are not often seen. They are the most common Dolphin species found in captivity. Numerous investigations of bottlenose dolphin intelligence have been

conducted, examining mimicry, use of artificial language, object categorization, and selfrecognition. "Fungie", also known as the Dingle Dolphin was a Bottlenose dolphin who was first seen in Dingle harbour in 1983 and continued to seek out human contact in the harbour over the following 38 years. In October 2020 he went missing. Marine experts have said that he either moved on to new waters, or simply died.
