PRSI Pay Related Social Insurance

People in employment must make Pay Related Social Insurance (PRSI) contributions to the Social Insurance Fund which helps pay for benefits and pensions. This is why it is called a Pay Related Social Insurance (PRSI) contribution. Some people who have unearned income are also liable for PRSI. There are currently 11 different PRSI classes. They are A, B, C, D, E, H, J, K, M, S and P - see 'Social insurance classes' on our website.

The social insurance payments you can get depend on the PRSI class you are in.

Each PRSI class is divided into different subclasses. These subclasses do not affect your entitlements under the social insurance system. They only relate to the amount of PRSI which you or your employer must pay.

How is PRSI calculated?

PRSI is calculated on your reckonable pay. Reckonable pay is your gross pay including any notional pay (or benefit in kind,) if applicable. There is no PRSI relief for employers on pension contributions made by employees. There is some PRSI relief on pension contributions paid by employers.

A wide range of payments are available to people who have paid social insurance. If you are not a Class A contributor, you can't get the full range of social insurance payments. This is because you are paying less towards social insurance than a Class A contributor. In certain cases, if your income falls below a certain amount, you do not have to pay a social insurance contribution, however, you will still be covered by social insurance because your employer must pay social insurance for you. PRSI contribution week

Your working week may not be the same as the PRSI contribution week. The PRSI contribution week starts on 1 January each year. Week one is the period from 1 January to 7 January, week two is from 8 January to 14 January and so on. For 2025, it started on Wednesday and ended on Tuesday. The contribution week can affect the social insurance cover of part-time workers and people job-sharing.

Most people pay Class A PRSI.

Class A applies to employees under age 66 with reckonable pay of €38 or more per week from all employments. Class A also applies to public servants recruited since 6 April 1995 and employees aged 66 to 70 (born after 1 January 1958) who are not getting a State Pension (Contributory).

Class A does not apply to people over 70 years of age and in insurable employment. They are insurable under Class J.

Planning Application Objection

I, Pat Colgan write in relation to planning application number SD24A/0290W made by Kilross Properties Ltd. With regard to lands adjacent to Ardeevin Manor, as submitted.

I wish to object to the proposed development. My objection is based on the following observations and grounds:

Health & Safety

For 97 units, there should be at least 160 car parking spaces, not 101, this is a joke. This will clog up parking in Ardeevin Manor and Avenue, so how will an ambulance or emergency vehicle get to houses at the top of the avenue, the Manor or indeed the proposed development.

If they are to come through Primrose Lane, there will be no turning space.

How are they to get to hospital, etc? Similarly, for fire brigade, ESB, waste collection, etc.

This is a health and safety issue, and the proposed development should be refused.

I would be grateful if you would consider the above in your assessment of the planning application.

DCG: Our Design and Communication Graphics 6th yr students were busy in recent weeks putting the finishing touches to their Leaving Cert project which was due in on Friday 24th January. 40% of the total marks in DCG are allocated to the production of the student assignment which involved graphical communication, creative problem-solving, spatial visualisation, computer graphics and Computer Aided Design (CAD) modelling skills. The students focused this year on modelling microphones and Mr. McCormack was very impressed with the high standard of finished projects!

The students will sit the final drawing exam in June, which accounts for the remaining 60% of the overall marks.

LCVP: The 6th yr LCVP classes completed their recorded interviews last week in the school with their teachers Mr. O' Carroll, Ms. Gough and Ms. Shanahan. The Recorded Interview is an ideal opportunity to prepare students for the world of work or further education whilst being an innovative form of the LCVP assessment. The students had prepared questions about themselves and about some of the LCVP activities, experiences and skills gained throughout the past 18 months. They were being assessed on their ability to communicate effectively in appropriate depth and detail, express informed opinion, support their answers with relevant examples. engage positively with the interviewer and use appropriate body language.

The feedback was very positive as the students talked about the skills they developed such as Communication and Planning skills. The Recorded Interviews, worth 12% of their Portfolios, lasted approximately 5 minutes and they will now be submitted for external correction. The students are working towards a deadline of Wednesday, 5th March for the completion of their LCVP Portfolios of Coursework, which is worth 60% of the overall marks available. The written part of their exam is worth the other 40%, and this will be held in early May.

Football: Hard luck to our senior footballers, who were beaten by the smallest of margins by Holy Family Rathcoole in the Senior Football Shield 1-4 final last Thursday. There was a little confusion as to the score-line at the end, with Lucan seemingly convinced that the scores were level, but the referee explained that one of Lucan's apparent scores, that was initially verified by the score umpires behind the goal, was in his view a wide. Unfortunately, there is no Hawk-Eye

technology is school's football! Eoin Maher impressed for Lucan in the full forward line, and he scored a fine goal mid-way through the 1st half as he bulldozed his way through a series of challenges before drilling a powerful low right-footed shot past the keeper into the bottom corner. Darragh Garrigan was also influential in the half-forward line with his strength in the air, speed, game intelligence and work rate. He also got some important scores for the team throughout.

Derry Ware, who was carrying a slight injury pre-match, came on in the 2nd half and he also had an excellent game. Derry's renowned strength, fitness levels and stamina were on display in a dynamic 2nd half display and it was his



"score" mid-way through the half that proved to be the subject of much debate at the final whistle. Lucan almost scored a point in the last seconds, but the post came to Rathcoole's rescue and they held on to win the game 3-9 to 2-11.

Transition Year: Our TY students enjoyed adrenaline-fuelled days at Kylemore Karting, Ireland's premier Karting arena, over the past two Wednesdays. The students had an amazing day of competitive racing, with numerous thrills and spills along the way! The students had practice laps 1st before doing timed laps, which determined whether they would be competing in the A, B or C Final. For the Time Trials, they raced on Track 3-Circuit de Susuka, Kylemore's newest track and its multi-level figure of eight is similar to the Formula 1 Circuit de Suzuka in Japan. It is 320m in length and known for its very challenging banked corners and fast speeds on its two full blast straights. After the qualifying laps were completed, there were six competitors in each Final and each one was filled with drama, thrills and plenty of talking points! Jack Norry and Paul Cronin won the two separate "A" Final, with both averaging impressive speeds of approximately 31 secs per lap. A thrilling, exciting and memorable day was had by all and we would like to thank the staff at Kylemore for taking such good care of our group. Safety was paramount at all times and the helpful and supportive staff ensured that all safety regulations were strictly enforced and followed at all times. It was undoubtedly one of the highlights of the year so far for the students.

Looking at February

"Anois teacht an earraigh, beidh an lá dul chun síneadh,

Is tar éis na Féile Bríde ardeoidh mé mo sheol." So said Antaine Ó Raifteirí the poet.

He was looking forward to the lengthening day and to be out and about.

Taking daylight hours and growth into account, February can be considered the start of spring.

However, meteorologists regard February as the last month of winter. They take temperature into account in deciding this. As we know February can sometimes give us very cold weather. One reason for this is the sea around Ireland is at its coldest in February and March. Another reason is the influence of anticyclones over Europe and Greenland which sometimes can send us very cold winds at this time of year.

Saint Valentin's Day (February 14)

The angle at which the sun shines down on us is the sun angle. By Saint Valentine's Day the sun angle we have gives us stronger sunshine than at any time in November. The bigger the sun angle the more heat we get from the sun and the rate of increase in this is faster in February compared to January. The increase is from 13 degrees angle at Christmas to 24 degrees angle at St. Valentine's Day. The direct heat of the sun becomes more noticeable on our faces as we go for a walk and puts a pep in our step even if the air temperature is cold. For reference, at the summer solstice (June 21) we have a very respectable 60 degree sun angle. Why are we not warmer than we usually are in summer? The sea temperature around us is relatively cool and in normal circumstances prevents the air temperature over us from rising too high.

Seasonal Affective Disorder (SAD)

SAD sufferers often report that they start to feel better around Saint Valentine's Day. SAD is related to the quantity of daylight and February brings a noticeable stretch in the evenings.

St. Valentine's Day 1998

At Casement Aerodrome an amazing 16C was recorded on February 14, 1998. This was 8 degrees above normal, making it the warmest St. Valentine's Day in 30 years. The reason for this was a southerly wind originating in the Sahara Desert. The following morning (February 15) a

covering of Sahara dust was to be seen on many cars in Lucan. Two months later, on Friday, April 10, 1998, snow was falling as politicians left Stormont. They signed The Good Friday Agreement. The variability of weather always amazes.

Weather Saying

Candlemas Day is February 2.

"If Candlemas Day be fair and bright, Winter'll have another flight.
But if Candlemas Day be clouds and rain,
Winter is gone and will not



come again". **Explanation**

The hope is that clouds and rain will bring in mild temperatures from the Atlantic, putting an end to the cold winter weather.

February News from The Past

Thomas Moore, poet and lyricist died on February 25 1852.

On February 11, 1926, W.B. Yeats unsuccessfully tried to stop a riot at The Abbey Theatre by appealing to the crowd from the stage. It was the third night of "*The Plough and the Stars*" by Seán O'Casey. The opening night was a great success. However, on the second night some people voiced their objections to the members of The Irish Volunteers bringing an Irish Flag into a public house. This was a harbinger of things to come. On the third night there was a lot of disturbance, shouting and singing. Eventually the police ejected the rioters, and the play was allowed to continue to the end.

The Stardust fire occurred on February 14, 1981. Many young people tragically lost their lives while enjoying themselves on a night out. On February 10, 2000, the Dart in Dublin was extended to Malahide and Greystones.

An Impressive February Day

On February 26, 2019, 17C was recorded at Casement Aerodrome! The normal temperature would be about 9C. The Irish Daily Mail referred to a Moroccan plume of warm air over the country. Photos from newspapers show people sitting outdoors or going for a walk on that February day with a taste of summer.

While repairs are ongoing, these works may cause temporary water disruptions. Saint Brigid is the patroness saint of Ireland, and one of its three national saints along with St. Patrick and St. Columba. Some historians suggest that Brigid is a Christianisation of the Celtic goddess Brigid.

Finally, Conor gave us a photograph of the Little Grebe (Irish Spágaire tonn) which is resident on ponds and lakes throughout Ireland.
