Following Shiny Lights! Are you following Trump!

Ignatian spirituality holds the image of light before us as a guide in decision making and prayer. St Ignatius was originally a soldier and had been in battles where it was important to hold and follow the standard of the battalion in order to ensure that one was in the right direction. The standard usually was flown on a shiny pole so that light and reflection would first beckon and then the colour of the flag as focus for the eye.

In Ignatian spirituality one becomes alert to the fact that light shines from both the friendly and the enemy camp so that we must look deeper and at the subtleties for greater certainty, security and purpose. It is usually tempting to following the light and things that are shiny; even supposedly if we are magpies!

Today's world shines many lights that draw us in many directions. I think that the greatest danger that we have in seeking the right light for ourselves and our community is that of rushing because we don't take time to discuss, consider and reflect. The quickest delivery of light filled ideas and things come through social media as quick flash lights. A quick flashlight just about provides us with direction for one step forward! If, instead, we stop and stand still for a while our eyes, senses, ideas will accommodate even to darkness and allow for a finding of a greater sure-foot!

Watching the inauguration of President Trump was shocking in its' demonstration of narcissism, capitalist power, condemnation of any difference or contrasting opinion, total casting aside of past leadership as a chain of connection and absolute delusion. The delusions of one person has many explanations whereas the delusions of that one with a large cohort of followers then becomes very destructive!

We can do nothing about the new era in the US, but we can watch our own consumption of information and check if the light that guides us is enduring and life-giving or simply flashing. We need to engage in broad and open discussion, take time to step apart and reflect and to have sure foundation and propose for all decisions and actions. As was posed at a recent input at the ecumenical gathering in St Mary's on Monday last, the questions of *Who do we believe in* and *What do we believe in* make a difference to how we live as individuals and as a universal people. We each have great power to do good or wrong. Let's choose our lights carefully and hold onto roots with deep meaning!

Were you off work due to the severe weather?

Your employment contract or statement of terms might include a set procedure for what happens if a severe weather event disrupts your work.

If it doesn't, the following applies:

If your workplace closes due to severe weather Your employer may lay you off if they cannot provide you with work temporarily.

If you are laid off, you may qualify for Jobseeker's Benefit or Jobseeker's Allowance depending on your situation.

If you are getting Working Family Payment, it may be affected if your working hours are reduced.

Employment rights when laid off

While laid off, you are still an employee of the company, and your contract of employment is still valid

You do not build up annual leave during lay-off, but you can use any annual leave you earned before being laid off.

If you can't make it to work due to severe weather

Your employer does not have to pay you if you miss work because of extreme weather. You may be able to take annual leave, but this needs to be agreed with your employer.

Some employers offer flexible arrangements, like working from home or making up the lost hours. These options are at your employer's discretion.

XL Bully Dogs

From 1 February 2025, it will be illegal to own an XL Bully dog unless you have a Certificate of Exemption.

So, if you already own an XL Bully, you must get a Certificate of Exemption before 1 February 2025. The certificate means you can keep your XL Bully at a particular location until the end of their natural life.

The rules for this ban are set out in the Control of Dogs (XL Bully) Regulations 2024.

If you are an XL Bully dog owner with questions about these regulations you can contact DogControl@drcd.gov.ie.

The Department of Rural and Community Development has a useful FAQ document (pdf) on the new XL Bully dog regulations.

How do I know if my dog is an XL Bully?

XL Bully dogs are a variant of the American Bully breed. They are usually bigger in height and body shape than other American Bully breed types.

The Department of Rural and Community Development has published a physical confirmation standard (pdf), which you can use to check if your dog meets the physical characteristics of an XL Bully dog.

It is your responsibility as the owner to determine if your dog is covered by the ban.

How do I get a Certificate of Exemption for my XL Bully dog?

If you own an XL Bully, you need to get a Certificate of Exemption before 1 February 2025. To get a Certificate of Exemption, your XL Bully must be:

Licenced Microchipped Neutered

You can apply for a certificate before 31 January 2025 by completing and submitting a form to your local authority. You get the application form from your local authority. It is free to get a Certificate of Exemption.



Can you believe that it is just over 25 years since each household received the Millennium Candle – the idea was to light your candle on New Year's Eve 1999.



Village Green Steps

Introduction

Under the supervision of the SDCC, contractors have been refurbishing the Village green in the Centre of Lucan for several weeks.

One of the features of this so-called enhancement works is the construction of a stair as part of the new layout design.

Some local people have commented adversely on the construction of a stair because of the safety implications for the public when in future use. The plan helpfully also includes the construction of a ramp that can be used in lieu of a stair.

Background

The stair will be used by the general public which will include the elderly, possibly the visually impaired, children pulling, pushing, reaching while playing. The physically impaired including all ages and capabilities.

Steps by their nature are inherently dangerous, their usage can result in many injuries ranging from minor to major such as broken legs or spinal injuries in the worst cases. Many patients are admitted to hospitals resulting from slips, trips and falls yearly.


Apart from the desirability of a stairs which is in question, the existing design is not as safe as it could be, because the "rise" and the "going" as presently envisaged is insufficient on grounds of safety. The SDCC has been informed of the preferred dimensions of the "rise" and the "going" in writing.

Our u17 team were beaten 2-0 by Ashbourne CS in the 3rd rnd of the Junior Leinster Cup on Wednesday. Ashbourne took a 1st half lead with a well taken free-kick from just outside the box. Lucan pressed hard for an equaliser and created some good opportunities, especially in an excellent 2nd half display. However, Ashbourne scored a penalty in the last minute to seal the win. Our **u15** team were knocked out of the Leinster Minor Shield last week after a narrow 1-0 defeat to Templeogue College in their 2nd rnd encounter. It was a very tight game, with very little between the teams, and Lucan were unlucky a number of times in front of goal, with some last-ditch defending and some slightly fortunate blocks denying them what would have been a deserved equaliser.

On Planning......

A proposal to erect a four-storey building with 20 apartments on a corner site within 50 meters of the busiest controlled road junction in the whole of Lucan is back in the limelight, in spite of a planning refusal four years ago. I am quoting from the planning inspectors 37 page Report.

Planning permission as refused and four reasons were given: It is contrary to local planning policy; it is contrary to national planning policy; it breaks section 3 of the Building Guidelines; the proposed building "would be visually obtrusive and would adversely impact on the visual and residential amenity of adjacent properties" and result in the intensification of traffic onto a heavily-trafficked regional road.

I would add that there was a heavy volume of objections and would note that my own submission wa rejected by the Planning Authority as 'invalid'.

The development is in direct contravention of the zoning objective 'to protect and improve residential amenities'. It poses an immediate and permanent danger to the hundreds of school children who cross the very busy road within a short distance of the corner. In addition to all of the objections noted above I would add a few more. The proposed four storey building is completely out of character with the existing streetscape and devalues properties in its vicinity. It towers over and overlooks the girlsschools' playing areas with dangerous implications.

Not a single voice has been raided in defence of this official vandalism. Not a single fourstorey building has been erected in Lucan during the fifty years I have lived here. We have fought many campaigns in that time to protect our village and to preserved the beauty of the Liffey Valley.

It is a real pity that residents are threatened with a desecration of the neighbourhood win which they have invested so much. \They deserve our support.

resume taking photographs.




Anna caught a lovely sunrise over Lucan.
