The *Pathways Programme* is geared towards those who wish to explore issues and questions of: faith; ministry; the Church today and the nature of belief, in an environment appropriate to Adult Learning and Adult Faith Development.



About the Course

The programme is run by the Archdiocese of Dublin, over two years, from late September to late May each year. It takes place on **Thursday evenings from 7.00p.m. -9.30 p.m.** in DCU St. Patrick's Campus, (MDCCE), Drumcondra Road Upper, Dublin, 9. **The next starting date for the programme will be on Thursday 28th. September 2023.** See contact details below. **Early application is advisable as places will be limited.**

Who is the Course for? This course is suitable for men and women of all ages and from all walks of life who are looking for an opportunity to consider questions about faith, belief and Church today.

Course Aims - The course values the life experience which the participants bring and, accordingly, group sharing is an integral part of the learning process each year. The course also offers the spiritual and theological formation which will enable participants to explore their faith with greater confidence. It also helps assist people to prepare themselves to respond to the needs of the Church and community and to work in partnerships and parish teams. Participants also have an opportunity to take part in various liturgies, and optional retreats and times of Directed Prayer during the year.

Course Entry Requirements - The main requirements are: a desire to explore faith; openness to participation; a willingness to listen and an interest in new ideas and approaches to ministry. No academic qualifications and no previous study in theology or spirituality are necessary. There is no required written work and there are no exams. There is a short application form in the programme brochure.

Course Cost - Fees are €400 each year. Fees may be paid in full at the beginning of each year or in instalments throughout each year. Part or full sponsorship may be available from some parishes.

Course Content

First Year – In the first year the emphasis is on the personal experiences and the faith journeys of the participants. **Subjects include**: How Adult Learn; Stages of Faith; Images of God; What Happened at Vatican II?; Introduction to Scripture; Celebrating the Church's Year; the Person of Christ; Personal Journey; Sacraments; the Moral Life; Spirituality and Prayer, Church and Parish – what it means to believe and to belong; Parish Pastoral Councils.

Second Year – The focus of the second year is on Christian living, the Gospel call and how we respond to it. **Subjects include**: Visions and Models of Church; Teachings of Pope Francis; Approaches to Ministry; Bereavement and Loss; Family; Pastoral Issues Today; Justice and Peace, Ecumenism; World Faiths; Ecology; Caring for Yourself.

Service is the State's money advice service, guiding people through dealing with problem debt for over 20 years. MABS phone service is open Monday to Friday 9 am to 8 pm on 0818 07 2000.

What is unpaid leave for medical care?

Unpaid leave for medical care was introduced on 3 July 2023. It gives you 5 days unpaid leave if you need to take time off work to deal with serious medical care for a child or other relevant person like a family member. The leave is available to both parents and carers – see 'Who can apply?' below.

You don't have to give your employer notice to take the leave in emergency circumstances. You should give notice if it's possible to.

The law covering leave for medical care is the Work Life Balance and Miscellaneous Provisions Act 2023.

Unpaid leave for medical care is different to force majeure leave*, which is paid leave for an urgent family crisis.

How long is the leave?

You have a right to 5 days leave for medical care in any 12 consecutive months. This is the statutory entitlement (that means the legal minimum). You don't need to take the leave all at once. It can be taken as single or multiple days.

Leave for less than a day

The leave cannot be taken in periods of less than one day. If you take a half day's leave, for example, it is still counted as one day.

Who can apply?

You can apply for the leave to care or support your: Child (including an adopted child), Spouse or civil partner, Cohabitant, Parent or grandparent, Brother or sister, Housemate (any other person to those listed above who lives in the same house as you) The person must need significant care or support for a serious medical reason. You do not need any minimum service with your employer to take this leave.

What serious medical care is covered?

The sick person must need significant care or support for a serious medical reason.

Serious medical reason is not defined in the Act.

Your employer can request relevant evidence of the medical need for the leave.

Relevant evidence is either:

A medical certificate signed by a doctor. Other evidence the employer may reasonably require. The medical cert does not need to state the nature of the medical condition. It only needs to be a statement of fact that the person is, or was, in need of significant care or support for a serious medical reason.

Do I need to give notice?

You don't have to give your employer notice to take the leave in emergency circumstances. You should give notice if it's possible to.

*Taking force majeure leave

By law, you are entitled to take up to 3 days force majeure leave in any 12-month period, or 5 days in a 36-month period. Depending on your employer and your contract of employment, you may be able to take more than this.

You are entitled to be paid while you are on statutory force majeure leave. If your employer allows you to take additional force majeure leave, you should check if it is paid for.

You cannot be unfairly dismissed for taking force majeure leave, or for asking to take it.

Your rights to force majeure leave are set out in the Parental Leave Acts 1998 and 2019.

How to apply for force majeure leave

Your employer must keep records of all force majeure leave taken by employees.

You must tell your employer as soon as possible that you need to take force majeure leave. Then, immediately on your return to work, you must make your application in writing to your employer. Your written application should include:

Your name, PPS number, Employer's name and address, Date(s) you took force majeure leave and the reasons why.

Your relationship to the person who was injured or ill

Alternatively, your employer may have a specific 'force majeure form' that they want you to fill in. Your contract of employment may also require you to provide a medical certificate as proof of the sudden illness or injury (you can request this from the doctor).

1993 - Lucan 30 years ago......

Looking back in the old issues of Lucan Newsletter over the past few weeks has thrown up some great gems; it's hard to believe how time has elapsed since some events. This week we go back 30 years, and find a few more gems.

Planning and Development

This was top of the agenda throughout 1993. In January, Dublin County Council met to form a Development Plan in relation to Lucan.

Proposed rezoning included tracts of land at Airlie Stud, St. Edmundsbury, Laraghcon, Finnstown and Tobarmaclogg, much to the annoyance of locals.

Later in the year, rezoning of lands at Esker came on the horizon.

Lucan Planning Council and the newly formed Liffey Valley Committee did their best trying to have some of the decisions reversed. Protection of the Liffey Valley was very important.

Laraghcon proved a very thorny issue and there were numerous letters and reports on what our Lucan Councillors did or did not do at meetings. It seems that this development was proposed by 4 Councillors from Castleknock – these were the days before Dublin County Council divided Lucan between Fingal and South Dublin County Councils!

There was an amendment to the planning application for **St. Eds** - for 80 acres of St. Eds and Woodville for residential use, and 250 acres of riverbank and parkland but this was still rejected, bringing development on that site to an end.

By June, Dublin County Council's **Draft Development Plan** was on display – rezoning 400 acres in Lucan for residential use.

Letters to the Editor - There were numerous letters for and against the proposed developments all throughout the year – both from locals and politicians.

Planning Applications were also made for: Further development of the **Superquinn site**.

The Rectory, Chapel Hill, for 29, 2 x storey dwellings, and demolition of the existing Rectory.

Construction of the Leixlip Bye-pass was underway.

Dublin County Council agreed to provide a **Skateboard Club** site at Griffeen Valley Park.

A Design and Cost Plan was prepared for **Lucan Library**. We had a Mobile Library at the time.

It was lamented that the **old Chapel Hill** and its community were disappearing with new build and businesses on site.

The ferocity of the flood waters was evident in Courtney's Car Park, where the river having come down the roadway, re-joined the main stream. The new **Adventure Centre** up Tinkers Hill was ready for the summer season. We all became familiar with Fort Lucan.

Nexus Reconciliation Centre in Primrose Lane was opened by President Mary Robinson. The centre was run by the Presbyterian Church and catered for young people from both sides of the divide in Northern Ireland.

It was noted that the **Bird Boxes**, which mysteriously appeared around the village the previous year, now housed Blue Tits, Starling and House Sparrows.

Lucan Community Council 1993
88 people attended the A.G.M. and Lilian
Harris was re-elected as Chairperson.

Much of their focus was on the planning and development of Lucan, but through their Tidy Towns group, they kept Lucan spick and span, and planted hundreds of daffodils that year. They also painted the balustrades of the Liffey Bridge.

A Rose Festival was organised and the Lucan Rose was Beverley Doyle.

It was the year that Lucan Community Council Chairperson – Lilian Harris visited Lucan Ontario, and invited their representatives to make a visit to our Lucan the following year.

Entertainment

The West County Musical Society produced *Guys and Dolls* in the Rupert Guinness Theatre.

If music was your thing, there were two groups in the area - Lucan Concert Band and the Liffey Valley Orchestra.

Lucan Goldstar Twirlers were the local Majorettes.


Lucan Drama produced *Play On* in the Spa Hotel, and also in pantomime – *The Magic Mountain of Lucan*, in Lucan Community College.



Joe is the north of Italy on holidays and has submitted photographs from Lake Garda and Verona. Lake Garda is the largest lake in Italy and derives its name from a town on its shores.

Because of the value and importance of its many historical buildings, Verona has been named a UNESCO World Heritage Site. Joe submitted a photograph of Verona's Roman amphitheatre, the Arena.
