We all enjoy summer and good weather, and many of us journey abroad to ensure that we get our share of the sunshine of foreign parts. Sunspots attract tourists in their hundreds of thousands keen to wallow in the sunshine. This year however, we might find ourselves grateful for the climate that we enjoy here in rainy Ireland, and even content to enjoy it - despite the cloudbursts. Temperatures in the high thirties and even forties that are happening around the globe this summer, are perhaps more than we bargained for, and take us way beyond our comfort zone. The talk of global warming that we have

been warned about these past years has begun to manifest itself as something all too real that poses a real and present danger.

In 2015, Pope Francis devoted an Encyclical letter – 'Laudato Si' to the subject of Care for our Common Home. The Letter is divided into six chapters each of which can be read in about 30 minutes; it is both insightful and challenging, and deserving of our attention.

"Chapter One: What is Happening to Our Common Home" summarizes the scope of current problems related to the environment. Issues discussed include pollution, climate change, water scarcity, loss of biodiversity, and global inequality.

"Chapter Two: The Gospel of Creation" draws on the Bible as a source of insight. The Genesis creation stories are interpreted as enjoining responsible cultivation and protection of nature. Past attempts to justify the absolute human domination of other species are "not a correct interpretation of the Bible" (LS 67). The natural world is further portrayed as a gift, a message, and a common inheritance of all people.

"Chapter Three: The Human Roots of the Ecological Crisis" explores social trends and ideologies that have caused environmental problems. These include the unreflective use of technology, an impulse to manipulate and control nature, a view of humans as separate from the environment, narrowly-focused economic theories, and moral relativism.

"Chapter Four: Integral Ecology" presents the encyclical's main solution to ongoing social and environmental problems.

"Chapter Five: Lines of Approach and Action" applies the concept of integral ecology to political life. It calls for international agreements to protect the environment and assist low-income countries, new national and local policies, inclusive and transparent decision-making, and an economy ordered to the good of all.

Lastly, "Chapter Six: Ecological Education and Spirituality" concludes the encyclical with applications to personal life. It recommends a lifestyle focused less on consumerism and more on timeless, enduring values. It calls for environmental education, joy in one's surroundings, civic love, reception of the sacraments, and an "ecological conversion" in which an encounter with Jesus leads to deeper communion with God, other people, and the world of nature.

Laudato Si is free to download from the Vatican website, or available to buy from Veritas, Mid Abbet Street and Blanchardstown. 

## Lucan Planning Council

LPC welcomes the news that South Dublin Co. Council has begun negotiations for the purchase of Lucan House and grounds to be used as a public amenity. This is wonderful news, LPC has always lobbied and worked for the protection of all Liffey Valley landscapes, especially in the Lucan catchment area. With the support of our local Councillors, Lucan Demesne was opened and St Edmundsbury is protected in the County Development Plans. The population of Lucan is now approaching 60,000and growing fast, it is vital that the St Eds lands continue to be protected to meet the future recreational and sporting needs of the area.

The recent changes to the Lucan bus routes by The National Transport Authority, especially the discontinuation of the No. 25, 239 and Connolly Hospital services has caused serious inconvenience for many elderly residents. A new W4 bus service from Tallaght stops in some areas of Lucan but only goes to Blanchardstown Shopping Centre, a 30 minute walk from the Hospital. LPC has a plan that would restore these services but that NTA are not prepared to meet us face to face to discuss our proposals. We are currently asking residents to sign a petition to the NTA to meet us to discuss our plans for improving traffic and public transport in Lucan.

LPC is also concerned that S.D.C.C. has not disclosed its plans for alterations to the Lucan Village Green area that are due to begin shortly. To date no discussion has taken place with Lucan residents on the matter. Many locals are concerned that the unique character of our lovely village may be lost. LPC will support any changes that will make the village more attractive for locals and visitors. A pedestrian bridge from Main Street to The Green has been mentioned. The works should not commence until the Council reveals its plans and gets the approval of the local community. Nobody wants a repeat of the Village Park fiasco.


## Summer Holidays, 1950's style



Oh what a beautiful morning, Oh what a beautiful day sang I, as I sat in our back garden appreciating the wonder of nature, the greenness of our grass, the height of the sunflowers as they stretched higher than the garden wall,

the roses in bloom displaying their petals in shades of white and yellow and the fuschia bush showing promise of a colourful display of blooms.

As I sat, I thought back on the garden of my childhood where cabbage, potatoes, lettuce and other vegetables were planted and nursed to grace our table and assist my father's weekly wage in providing for our family needs. The Ireland of the 1950's was a different entity to the Ireland we know today. My father was a fitter with CIE, serving his apprenticeship in Broadstone Railway before Inchicore became the hub for CIE Railway works. A perk of being an employee of CIE Railway was that you received special passes



and reduced fares, known as privileges, for you and your family to travel. My father had a 2 week holiday every year and it was then that our

family took full advantage of the travel perks. We became day-trippers, making journeys to Ireland's cities and towns using our passes and visiting beaches using our privileges.

Among the cities we visited were Galway, Cork, Waterford, Belfast, Sligo and Limerick. It was an early start for all of us, leaving our house to catch the 22 bus into Dublin around 7am and making our way to Kingsbridge (Heuston) Station if we were travelling to Cork, Limerick or Waterford, Amiens Street (Connolly) Station for Belfast or Drogheda and Westland Row (Pearse) Station for Galway, Mullingar or Athlone.

On these journeys we would wear our Sunday best and bring light refreshments for

the train journey. We chatted, played games and window gazed out on the green fields, the cows, sheep grazing and the hinterland of Ireland. We



ooh'd and aah'd as we crossed the Shannon in Athlone, marvelled at Donnelly's Hollow and the Devil's Bit, while we formed a sense of the Ireland that lay beyond our own home patch and parish.

The train journey that we looked forward to most of all was our visit to Aunty Madge in Enniscorthy. My Aunty Madge was a telegraphist with CIE and following postings in Kingsbridge and Ballinasloe Train Stations she was sent to Enniscorthy. Here my Aunty Madge married a local man Kevin Sheehan and thus Enniscorthy became her forever home. We, the Kenny children, were delighted to have country cousins, thus our annual train journey and visit to Enniscorthy was the highlight of our summer holiday.

The Wexford train departed from Westland Row (Pearse) Station. We knew all the stations along the route, stopping first in Dun Laoghaire and then Bray before we got clearance to travel onwards through the tunnels to Greystones. The journey through all three tunnels was dark and scary but yet it was a highlight of our trip. We knew all the stations we passed through, becoming familiar with Avoca and the Meeting of the Waters. In those days we passed through Camolin and Ferns before arriving in Enniscorthy Station, where my cousins were waiting, like a guard of honour, to meet us. My cousins are Anne, Gerard, Patricia, Mary, Delores, Martin, Finola, Terence, Gráinne



and Sinéad. Then we walked up St Senan's Road to their house in the foothills of Vinegar Hill where Aunty Madge and Uncle Kevin and the hens waited to greet us.

Our seaside trips were when the privileges were used, these privileges allowed us travel for a reduced fare. Our favourite seaside was Claremont Strand, Howth. A different type of planning was needed for these excursions.

Over .....

The night before we set out, sandwiches were made and bags were packed which included all the picnic requirements including cups, milk, tea and sugar. Then the

swimming togs (describing 1950's swimming togs is best left to the imagination) and towels, a bat and ball, raincoats, calamine lotion and plasters were added and we were all set to go. Once again an early start was made, usually we arrived in Howth around 11am and headed for the beach intent on getting a good spot in the shelter of the sand dunes. We started with a dip in the sea, followed by our

sandwiches and Marietta biscuits. On a point of information there was a hut on the beach where you could purchase a Teapot of boiling water for 6d (pence) and a deposit of 6d, the deposit was refunded when you returned the Teapot.

picnic which included sandy

Rounders, Queenie Eye O and Red Rover were some of the games we played, while making sandcastles and burying feet in the sand were also part of our seaside adventure. Come 4 o'clock we were all rounded up and bags packed for our return journey to Dingle Road. Often we would walk down the Howth quayside to check the fishing boats, where my mother bought fresh fish straight from the fishermen, before boarding the train for Amiens St (Connolly) Station.

Pleasantly tired after our day at the seaside, is how I would describe the Kenny children, on our journey home. We knew we could look forward to more weekday adventures before my father's holiday was over and he returned to Inchicore works and the Wagon Shop.

## Life is What You Make It

I've never had much luck in my life, I felt differently when in walked this character dressed in builder's overalls and headed in my direction. Without a second glance, he picked myself and two friends up and headed to the checkout. We were soon on our way to an old-style Georgian mansion.

My last outing was probably a few months ago when I was taken to a house where they were adding on an extension. When the chap went to fit me, he realised I was just a single light switch and not a double. I was put to one side and sat in his toolbox until, eventually, I was returned to the store for exchange for credit.

Today, I felt this was really my lucky day at last. Don't get me wrong; I was more than happy to sit on the shelf watching the world go by. But my expectations were high as we arrived at our destination. The house had wealth written all over it. My friend, the double switch, was soon wired up and ready for his permanent service in a large dining room — happiness is! The other double switch was headed for the master bedroom, with all its trimmings and breadth — taking views of the surrounding countryside — the lucky duck.

I was starting to get excited because I reckoned I was earmarked for the smaller bedroom, which had a beautiful ensuite. I thought to myself, "I could be happy here". But no, I was tucked into his pocket as we made our way down a dark corridor. We reached a door that opened to a flight of stairs. With the aid of a torch, we proceeded down the stairs to the basement. It was fairly packed with what looked like junk. Crestfallen, I was soon screwed to the wall and fully functioning, ready for what lay ahead.

Without dimensions, life can be a four-letter work. Like me – a switch – you go on and off, you live, you die. The dimension comes from what we do with the life we are given. And that is what makes the difference between life and living, I wanted to do so much in life, to plan, to experience, to do! I wanted to live.

Over the next few months, the basement too underwent major renovation and was transformed from a junk room to a study, where the owner retreated to read and write and get away from the turmoil of life. I knew then that my switch was not yet on – my real life was just beginning.

### Do you have travel insurance?

You should get travel insurance for yourself and your family. If you have a travel insurance policy already, or travel insurance is included in your health insurance policy, you should check that you are covered for hospital treatment for COVID-19.

You should bring your European Health Insurance Card with you if you are travelling to the EEA or Switzerland. You cannot use your EHIC in the UK. But you can still get the healthcare you need. You will need to show your Irish passport to the GP or hospital. Make sure that it is in date, it must be renewed every 4 years and each family member needs their own. An EHIC does not replace travel insurance.

Ireland and Australia have a reciprocal health agreement. This means that Irish visitors to Australia will receive emergency services and assistance towards the cost of prescribed drugs and medicines on the same basis as persons ordinarily resident in Australia.

Irish citizens travelling in the UK are entitled to access healthcare through the Common Travel Area.

#### **Driving abroad**

If you plan to drive while abroad, make sure that your Irish driving licence is valid and that you bring it with you.

Some countries outside the European Economic Area (the member states of the European Union, Norway, Iceland and Liechtenstein) may require you to hold an International Driving Permit (IDP) in addition to your Irish driving licence.

See the IDP application form (pdf) for a full list of countries that recognise the permit.

Always make sure you are properly insured for driving while overseas.

Get more information on driving abroad from the Road Safety Authority.

#### While abroad

Make a note of the address, telephone number and opening hours of the Irish Embassy or Consulate in the country you are visiting. In countries where there is no Irish diplomatic or consular representation, you may seek emergency assistance from embassies or consulates of other European Union countries. On its website, the Department of Foreign Affairs provides advice on

what to do to stay safe while abroad and what to do in an emergency.

## Travel tips

These are some other tips to help with your journey.

Check if you need any vaccines or immunisations before you travel (At least 8 weeks in advance). Make a note of the 24-hour emergency number of your bank so you can cancel your credit card or debit card it if it is stolen.

Check your mobile data allowance with your mobile phone service provider. (For travel outside of the EEA).

Do you need to bring a special adapter to plug in your electrical devices?

The Department of Foreign Affairs in Ireland provide travel advice to Irish people planning a trip overseas.

The HSE has information on preventing illness and infection while abroad.

The Health Protection Surveillance Centre provides advice for travellers on how to avoid illness on its website.

The World Health Organization has information and advice regarding health and international travel.
