World Elder Abuse Awareness Day

(WEAAD) takes place each year on 15 June.

This year the theme for the day is "Hear Me, Support Me, Challenge Elder Abuse."

Abuse can take place in any situation and any person is at risk. A vulnerable person is someone who may be restricted in capacity to guard themselves against harm or exploitation or to report such harm or exploitation.

Abuse can be perpetrated (carried out) by a range of people, such as strangers, institutions, or family members. It may happen when an older person or a person with a disability lives alone or with a relative. It may also happen in residential or day-care settings, in hospitals, home support services and other places assumed to be safe, or in public places.

Elder abuse is the abuse of someone aged 65 or over and it happens in a relationship where there is an expectation of trust. Elder abuse can be a single or repeated act, or a lack of action, which causes harm or distress to the older person, or that violates their human and civil rights.

The HSE has Safeguarding and Protection Teams in place in every region of the country. These teams are responsible for adult safeguarding within services for older persons and services for people with disabilities.

If you suspect someone you know may be a victim of abuse, or if you are a victim of abuse yourself, you should contact your local health centre, your GP, public health nurse or the Garda Síochána.

Dear Neighbour,

In view of the many complaints raised by residents regarding the volume of sap shed by all of the sycamore trees through your neighbourhood, the following letter has been forwarded this week to SDCC Chief Executive and Councillor members of Lucan/Palmerstown /North Clondalkin Area Committee.

"Within Hillcrest estate, Lucan, bounded by Newcastle Road and Dodsboro Road, there are more than 200 sycamore trees which have grown to heights exceeding 10 metres, towering over adjacent houses and all growing within 2 metres of property boundaries, the vast majority of which are constructed of cement block.

Your estate management records should confirm the extent to which footpaths throughout our neighbourhood have required, and continue to require, total replacement in order to address serious defects which have contributed to significant injuries suffered by pedestrians over a number of years. Some residents have also reported the need to replace front boundary walls more than once since they moved into the estate.

Most of our residents are the original first-time purchasers of homes in Hillcrest and are now aged in their late 60s and upwards, a sizeable number of whom are experiencing mobility difficulties and other age related health issues. They have been finding it increasingly burdensome and costly to deal with the negative impacts of such inappropriately large trees having been planted outside their homes: seedlings have taken root in back gardens as far as 25-30 metres distance from the actual trees, fallen leaves take weeks to be raked and bagged for collection - otherwise they present a serious hazard to pedestrians of all ages - and, as evidenced very recently, footpaths, driveways, vehicles, wheelchair and buggy wheels are regularly coated in increasingly thick layers of sap which adheres stubbornly to footwear and, when dried out, can be treacherous on hard surfaces indoors.

It is a cause of concern to all residents that underground infrastructure is reported to be adversely affected by the extent of root spread encountered by utilities contractors. Many householders have also expressed serious anxiety at the possibility of one of

these trees being felled during a severe weather event, particularly as they have not been subject to regular pruning or inspection for damage or defects. It is noted that SDCC's current tree management plan precludes the planting of trees such as sycamores which have an aggressive root system and the potential to grow to more than 30 metres. As a street tree, it has proven to be wholly inappropriate for a housing development such as ours.

In consideration of all of the above, we ask SDCC to proceed, as a priority, with the removal of all sycamore trees throughout Hillcrest Estate and their replacement with suitable alternative specimens."

We will update you all as soon as we receive responses.

Woodville / Woodies Junction – Pedestrian

Safety: Some residents had raised concerns with me regarding the existing pedestrian crossing / junction between Woodville and Woodies. Ongoing reports of cars coming into the bend too fast, coupled with the bending wall so close to the lights has given rise to pedestrian concerns, and highlighted as particularly dangerous for older persons and children. The junction is marked for inclusion for consideration for extensive

reconfiguration works as part of the NTA's BusConnect rollout. In the meantime, council officials have given me a commitment to introduce a new yield sign on approach, change the flashing green arrow to amber and to extend to pedestrian crossing time.

Westbury: During a recent courtesy door knock, some residents in Westbury Court highlighted the difficulty exiting the estate, and some related nearby road concerns along the Newcastle Road. I have raised these issues with the Council.

I am a member of the Council's Housing Strategic Policy Committee. At our recent meeting we were given the following updates.

Housing Grants Online: There are 3 grants for private housing: The Housing Adaptation Grant; Housing Aid for Older People; and the Mobility Aid Grant. Amounts available to eligible applicants are based on a household income assessment. The Council will soon go live with an online application system for these grants.

Vacant Homes Refurbishment Grant: The amount that can be applied for under the Vacant Homes Refurbishment Grant has been increased since 1 May 2023. There have been other changes since the 1st May which expand the scope of this grant.

Tenant in Situ Scheme: The Council's target aims to acquire at least 150 properties this year that have tenants in situ that are at risk of homelessness.

The Gardens came into State care in 1878 and the magnificent restoration of the Turner Curvilinear Range of glasshouses was completed for the bicentenary of the Garden in 1995.



Anna supplied photos of bridges in county Mayo, some of them built around 1910 and one from Claregalway built in the 18th century over the old course of the river Clare. The full bridge, which was restored in 2001 comprises 9 stone arches which are above the level of the current road.
