Bizarre Times!

Current times feel rather bizzare! The voices of a tiny number of extremely powerful people shout above all to squash down those who are vulnerable or different in any way to a space of near total exclusion. The unwarranted adulation of the powerful few further inflates their power, ego and status as they peddle lies and thrive in largely coercive activity. It is very frightening when even democratic societies support that which is strongly dictatorial and largely coercive!

Are we content to live with a situation of racism being at large, the needs of the vulnerable being disregarded and any difference or valued tradition disregarded as disposable? As Irish people, we have had the freedom of the world in terms of seeking refuge and opportunity while in turn the gifts and talents of the Irish concerned, have added value to the new place of residence. That is not to say that the Irish were always treated well by all among whom they lived – of course not, but let us not treat others as we ourselves would not wish to be treated.

Those who are powerful by stealth take advantage of others while seeming to offer them privilege and status. Being chosen by such people will always be a fleeting experience as is the nature of narcissism. The narcissistic person only has eyes for themselves and use others as a mirror in the moment. Lose one's sheen as a mirror, or if they find a better mirror, they will drop one like a hot potato! Best to be discerning by association and slow in adulation.

The scales of justice are tilted one direction currently needing weight and substance to bring about a balance. It is not largely fashionable to stand and declare if what is happening is right or wrong. Every right or wrong that we do, allow or say has impact on others as well as ourselves. The tilt in the scales in the direction of injustice will only occur if good people do nothing, or stay in the comfort zone, when right action needs to be taken. When we hear the boom of the loudest voice it is best to give ear to the quiet voice of heart space and gut core to know what really matters and act accordingly.

The true value of any person or society is realised in how the most vulnerable and marginalised are treated. Let us take time for the formative conversations that might prevent growth of narcissism and enable the appreciation of the value of each one as gift. The busyness of life allows us to forget the value of the long casual chats that work out what is important to us as society and how we truly are connected together.

Motor Insurance

You must have motor insurance to drive your vehicle on Irish roads.



Motor insurance is meant to protect you against liability in an accident. It will cover the costs of the other driver's property and injuries if you are found at fault for an accident. If you are involved in an accident and found not to be at fault, the insurance of the responsible party will cover your costs.

When you buy a motor insurance policy from an insurance company, you will get an insurance disc and a certificate of insurance. You must clearly display a current insurance disc on your vehicle at all times when driving.

From 31 March 2025, you will need to give your driver number and the driver number of any named drivers on the policy. You can find the driver number in section 4 (d) of an Irish Driver's licence or Learner Permit.

You can get guidance on what you must do if you are involved in a road traffic collision on An Garda Síochána's website. The Government of Ireland has information on how to make an insurance claim if you are involved in a road traffic accident.

There are 3 types of motor insurance available in Ireland:

Third party

Third party fire and theft Comprehensive insurance

Which you choose will depend on the level of cover you need and how much you are willing to pay – information on our website.

Driving Without Insurance

Failure to have motor insurance or driving without insurance in Ireland is generally

punishable by:

A fine of up to €5,000 5 penalty points; and

At the discretion of the court, a term of imprisonment not exceeding 6 months.

The court may decide that you will be disqualified from driving instead of incurring penalty points. In that case, you will be disqualified for 2 years or more for a first offence and 4 years or more in the case of a second offence committed within 3 years of the first.

You should note that where a member of An Garda Síochána believes that a vehicle registered in Ireland (or outside Ireland) is being used in a public place without insurance, the vehicle may be impounded.

Accidents involving an Uninsured Driver

In the case of accidents with uninsured or untraced drivers, the Motor Insurers' Bureau of Ireland (MIBI) is the body which compensates the victims.

At the same time, any claim for personal injury must be sent to the Injuries Resolution Board. This is the statutory body which provides independent assessment of personal injury compensation for victims of workplace, motor and public liability accidents.

You must disclose all relevant information to an insurer when initially buying or renewing your insurance. Otherwise, the policy you buy may subsequently be deemed null and void. If you are unsure whether certain facts are relevant, you should disclose them to the insurer and it is then up to the insurer to decide.


Anniversary

well as promoting both physical and mental health. Thank you to the teachers who organised it and for everyone who participated.



A Potential for Misuse of Authority: Altering a Part 8 Approved Project via Section 38 of the Road Traffic Act 1994

South Dublin County Council (SDCC) recently had a consultation titled Lucan Road Boardwalk Alterations. South Dublin County Council (SDCC) appears to be attempting to alter a Part 8 Approved Project by invoking **Section 38 of the Road Traffic Act 1994**. This raises concerns about transparency, community involvement, and the proper use of legislative powers in urban planning and development.

Understanding the Processes

Part 8 Process: Under the Planning and Development Regulations 2001, the Part 8 process allows local authorities to seek planning permission for specific projects, such as public infrastructure. It mandates public consultation, giving elected councillors and community members the opportunity to voice their opinions and concerns. After considering this feedback, the local authority finalizes its plans.

Section 38 of the Road Traffic Act 1994: This section grants local authorities the power to implement traffic management measures without undergoing the full planning process required by Part 8. While intended for quick traffic-calming measures, it can bypass the essential public consultation and transparency that Part 8 ensures.

The Issue at Hand: Any changes to an already approved Part 8 project should require a new Part 8 process, ensuring that the community and elected councillors can review and provide input on the proposed alterations. Using Section 38 to bypass this process constitutes executive overreach, undermining transparency and community involvement.

Lack of Effective Communication: SDCC has proposed significant changes to the Lucan Demesne and the cycle path from the Greenway into Sarsfield Park, both of which were approved by councillors in 2022. However, there has been no effective communication with the over 60,000 residents and businesses in Lucan regarding these alterations. Key concerns include:

No Leaflet Drops or Local Press Announcements: Residents and businesses were not informed about the proposed changes unless they were on a specific SDCC mailing list or happened to visit the SDCC public consultation portal.

Overwhelming Online Consultations: SDCC simultaneously launched three public consultations/surveys (Lucan Demesne, Sarsfield Park cycle path, and Lucan House development) without adequate communication. This approach overwhelms and confuses residents, making it difficult for them to respond effectively.

Misleading Terminology: SDCC has used the terms "consultation" and "survey" interchangeably, potentially blurring the lines between formal submissions and informal feedback. This could undermine the legal weight of public responses.

The Lucan Road Boardwalk Alterations Survey: A Biased Approach:

The Lucan Road Boardwalk Alterations survey is

particularly problematic. It is designed in a way that skews responses toward a predetermined outcome: Question 7: Respondents must agree to parking removal to submit their answers, effectively excluding those who oppose the changes. This makes the survey biased and unreliable, as it does not fairly represent public opinion.

Misleading Terminology: The survey refers to the cycle path alterations as "Lucan Road Boardwalk alterations", further confusing respondents about the nature of the changes.

Inappropriate Use of Section 38: SDCC is proposing significant alterations to the 2022 Part 8-approved cycle path into Sarsfield Park, including the construction of a 90 metre board walk, the removal of a considerable number of trees and 8 car parking spaces on Lucan Road These changes warrant a new Part 8 consultation, as they significantly deviate from the original plan. Instead, SDCC is attempting to implement these changes through Section 38, which: Sidelines Councillors: By using Section 38, SDCC is removing the decision-making and voting rights of elected councillors.

Exceeds the Scope of Section 38: The correct use of Section 38 is to introduce traffic-calming measures on or within the boundaries of public roads. The proposed works, which involve cutting down trees and creating a new boardwalk, fall outside this scope. Cost Exemption: Projects exceeding €126,000 are exempt from Section 38. The proposed works far exceed this threshold, making Section 38 an inappropriate mechanism.

Conclusion: SDCC's actions raise serious questions about its commitment to transparency and community involvement in urban planning. By attempting to bypass the Part 8 process and using Section 38 inappropriately, SDCC risks undermining public trust and sidelining elected representatives. The proposed changes to the Sarsfield Park cycle path warrant a new Part 8 consultation, ensuring that residents and councillors have a meaningful opportunity to review and respond to the alterations.

Key Questions for SDCC:

Why has SDCC failed to communicate effectively with the local population regarding these significant changes?

Is the simultaneous posting of multiple consultations a deliberate strategy to overwhelm and confuse residents? Why is SDCC using misleading terminology, such as conflating "consultations" with "surveys"? How can SDCC justify the biased design of the Lucan Boardwalk survey, which excludes opposing views? Why is SDCC using Section 38 inappropriately to bypass the Part 8 process and sideline elected councillors?



Road/Hill Between N4 & Lucan Village - Improved Lighting: I am calling for a public lighting survey/inspection by the Council, that seeks to address the poor lighting on Adamstown Road (hill stretching from Fairy House down to Courtney's Pub), whilst also committing to refer any necessary interim tree pruning works that are encroaching on the existing lighting.

Newcastle Road – Path Upgrades: For too long, the section of path opposite St Patrick's Church has remained in a poor state. St. Mary's Camera Soirée

Frances was out in Hillcrest and captured some of the participants in the Lucan St. Patrick's Day Parade on camera. There was a very interesting documentary on RTE 1 on the day about the saint. It appears that there were Christians in Ireland before the arrival of Patrick and that prior to Patrick's arrival Pope Celestine 1 had sent the Frenchman Palladius as bishop of the Christians of Ireland.





Turning to the present day, Brendan sent in a photo of the Hermitage Golf Club House taken from an unusual vantage point.

He treated us to a sunny March morning in St. Catherine's Park and also provided a closeup of Willow Catkins. Catkins have a very important role in spreading tree seeds, thereby allowing the tree to reproduce and show us that Spring is well and truly on the way.

Brendan also gave us a fascinating example of the refraction of light in photography. If you look closely at the raindrop in the photograph of daffodils you can see the reflection of a daffodil in it. Refraction is the bending of light as it passes from one transparent substance into another. Refraction also happens with sound, water, radio and other waves.







This bending by refraction makes it possible for us to have lenses, magnifying glasses, prisms and rainbows. Even our eyes depend upon this bending of light. Without refraction, we wouldn't be able to focus light onto our retina.
