What date is Easter Monday this year?

The date of the Easter Monday public holiday is different each year. This year Easter Monday falls on 21 April 2025.

Do I get a day off on Good Friday?

Good Friday is not a public holiday. This year, Good Friday falls on 18 April 2025.

While some workplaces close on Good Friday, you have no automatic entitlement to time off work on that day.

When are schools closing for Easter in 2025?

All schools close for Easter on Friday, 11 April 2025, unless they need to make up for time they've lost due to unforeseen school closures. If a school needs to make up such time, it can shorten the Easter break by staying open, up to and including Wednesday, 16 April 2025.

All schools re-open on Monday, 28 April 2025.

Compensation for overbooked, cancelled or delayed flights

Air passengers departing from an EU/EEA airport have protections under EU law. These protections also apply to passengers leaving from an airport outside of the EU/EEA but arriving at an EU/EEA airport on an EU/EEA licensed carrier.

If your flight is cancelled, the airline must give you a choice of:

A refund of the cost of your ticket within 7 days. Re-routing to your final destination at the earliest opportunity, or at a later date if you prefer and if seats are available.

You may also be entitled to compensation depending on when you were told about the cancellation and whether you were offered a suitable alternative flight.

My flight is delayed, am I entitled to anything from the airline?

You must be offered free meals and refreshments depending on how long the waiting time is and if your flight is covered by the law.

The following flights are covered by law: Delays of 2 hours or more in the case of flights of 1500 km or less.

Delays of 3 hours or more for all flights within the EU of more than 1500 km, and all other flights between 1500 km and 3500 km.

Delays of 4 hours or more in the case of all other flights.

You must be offered free hotel accommodation if you need to stay overnight for one night or more, as well as transport between the hotel and the airport. You must be offered 2 free telephone calls, fax messages, or emails.

If your flight is delayed for 5 hours or more, you must be offered a full refund. This includes a return flight to your first point of departure.

What if I get upgraded or downgraded?

If you are offered an upgrade, the airline cannot charge you anything extra. If you agree to be downgraded, the airline must reimburse you a percentage of the difference in price between your original seat price and the new seat price.





To date, the event has raised 815euro for Pieta House, with some further sponsorship money expected in the coming days.

Inclusion Week: Our Inclusion Week, which was held in the school from Tuesday 18th to Friday 21st March, was a great success with a whole host of interesting and enjoyable activities for our extremely diverse student population. On Wednesday, 1st and 2nd yr students attended an autism awareness talk hosted by "As I Am", an organisation dedicated to supporting the Autistic community and their families to fully engage in Irish life, and build the capacity of society to facilitate true inclusion.

Kahoot quizzes were held in Junior Cycle classes, with many of the questions based around the different world religions, cultures, languages and flags.



Friday was Colours Day and the students were encouraged to wear red, to send a powerful message of anti-racism (similar to the "Show Racism the Red Card" campaign).

Well done to everyone who helped make Inclusion Week so successful, meaningful and memorable for all involved.

Soccer: Our 1st yr soccer team advanced to the 1-4 finals of the Dublin Metropolitan League after a hard-fought 2-1 victory, after extra time, against Clonkeen College, Blackrock last Thursday. Clonkeen dominated the 1st half and they took a deserved lead after 15mins when their number 10 lashed home from inside the box. Lucan regrouped at half time and they deservedly drew level 10mins into the 2nd half thanks to a sublime, dipping half-volley from out near the side-line by Jack Kennedy.

Extra-time was needed to separate two-evenly matched teams. Just 2mins into the 1st period of extra-time, Finn O' Sullivan cut inside and hit a well-struck, right-footed effort into the bottom corner, for what proved to be the winning goal. They will now play at home to St. Fintan's Sutton in the 1-4 finals.

Football: Hard luck to our u16 football team who were beaten 4-8 to 2-6 by Belmayne ETSS in the Dublin League "C" Final held in Abbotstown last Friday. The teams were level at half-time (1-3 apiece) with Daniel Godson getting the Lucan goal. Conor McHugh did manage to breach the Belmayne rear-guard with a well-taken goal but the team tired a little late-on, and Belmayne ran out deserving winners in the end.

SECOND ARTICLE: The Consequences of SDCC's Misuse of Section 38 to Alter a Part 8 Approved Project

This week, we examine the troubling consequences of South Dublin County Council (SDCC) altering an existing Part 8 development by invoking Section 38 of the 1994 Road Traffic Act. This move raises serious questions about transparency, community trust, and the integrity of urban planning processes.

Consequences of Section 38 Changes to the Approved 2022 Part 8 Project

1. Cyclist Safety Concerns: The proposed changes would place a cycle path along Old Lucan Road, exposing cyclists to significant safety risks. Cyclists would be forced to ride in close proximity to a busy 50 km/h roadway whilst cycling against the flow of traffic. This proposal blatantly disregards the National Cycling Guidelines, which emphasize five essential needs for cyclists: Safety, Comfort, Attractiveness, Directness, and Coherence.

How can SDCC justify a plan that compromises cyclist safety, especially when the existing Part 8 proposal—featuring a boardwalk which takes the cyclists off the road completely—fully addresses these needs?

- 2. Environmental Impact: In 2022, SDCC determined that the environmental impact of the Part 8 proposal was negligible, concluding that an Environmental Impact Assessment Report (EIAR) was unnecessary. However, no environmental study has been conducted as part of the current non-statutory consultation. Why has SDCC failed to conduct an environmental assessment for these new changes, especially when the original proposal was deemed environmentally sound? Is this an attempt to sidestep scrutiny?
- 3. Reduction in Parking Availability: The removal of 8 car spaces on Old Lucan Road would reduce parking availability for up to 162 cars per day in an area where affordable parking is already scarce. This change could harm local businesses by reducing customer access and complicating drop-offs and pick-ups at nearby crèches. Transferring these parking spaces to the far end of Sarsfield Park will create significant inconvenience for parents and could lead to decreased foot traffic and revenue for local businesses. These new proposed spaces are 1.9km by car away from the existing spaces How can SDCC claim that relocating parking 1.9 km away is a practical solution, especially when it will exacerbate congestion on Main Street and negatively impact local businesses and access to child care?
- 4. Overflow Car Park in Sarsfield Park: Creating an overflow car park in Sarsfield Park, a well-established residential area, contradicts principles of good planning. This move would increase daily traffic flow, leading to higher noise and air pollution, a heightened risk of accidents, and greater congestion in an area already struggling with heavy traffic during peak times. Why is SDCC prioritizing parking convenience over the quality of life for Sarsfield Park residents, particularly when this idea would have been rejected during the 2022 Part 8 consultation?

SDCC's Misuse of Authority, Abuse of Power, and Broken Trust with the Lucan Community
Altering the 2022 Canal Loop Part 8 approved project two years later using Section 38 is a clear

misuse of authority. This move bypasses necessary public consultation and transparency, undermining the ethical responsibility of SDCC to involve councillors and the community in urban planning decisions. How can SDCC claim to value community involvement while using Section 38 to sideline public input and push through significant changes without proper consultation? The purpose of Section 38 is to enable local authorities to implement **traffic-calming** measures, not to alter agreed-upon Part 8 projects. The Part 8 process, enshrined in the Planning and **Development Regulations 2001**, ensures community involvement in key infrastructure projects. Using Section 38 in this context is inappropriate and undermines the democratic process. Why is SDCC using Section 38 to bypass the Part 8 process, especially when the proposed changes involve significant alterations to an already approved project?

Lack of Effective Communication and Engagement SDCC has failed to communicate effectively with the over 60,000 people living and working in Lucan. The council posted several online consultations directly impacting the village without adequate notice or engagement. By using terms like "submission" and "survey" interchangeably, SDCC has confused residents and undermined the legal weight of public responses. Is the simultaneous posting of multiple consultations a deliberate strategy to overwhelm and confuse residents, making it harder for them to respond effectively? The Lucan Boardwalk survey is particularly problematic. It is designed to skew responses toward a predetermined outcome, as respondents must agree to parking removal to submit their answers. This biased approach excludes opposing views and undermines the credibility of the consultation process. How can SDCC claim this survey represents fair and balanced public opinion when it is designed to exclude those who oppose the changes?

What Can Be Done? As the time to object has passed, the only option available to residents is to contact their local councillors and TDs to voice their disapproval of SDCC's actions. Without active community pushback, this deplorable treatment of Lucan by SDCC will likely continue. Will the residents of Lucan stand by and allow SDCC to repeatedly bypass transparency and community involvement, or will they demand accountability and fair treatment in future planning issues?

Conclusion: SDCC's actions represent a clear misuse of authority, an abuse of power, and a breach of trust with the Lucan community. By using Section 38 to bypass the Part 8 process, SDCC has sidelined elected councillors, ignored community concerns, and pushed through changes without proper scrutiny. The consequences—compromised cyclist safety, environmental neglect, reduced parking availability, and diminished quality of life for residents—are unacceptable. How can SDCC rebuild trust with the Lucan community after such a blatant disregard for transparency and fairness in urban planning? The time has come for residents to demand better from their local authority.

centenary of his death. The Michael Cusack Centre is a treasure chest of living history.



However, this is being done by taking space from the island at the junction. Just to warn residents also that the island will no longer be an island and there will no longer be a slip road to turn left on to Lucan Road. These very radical changes, including changed access to the back of the Church, originate from St. Joseph's planning permission granted in 2016, and are being carried out on the school's behalf. They fruit between March and June and are found particularly beside woodland tracks. Brendan found them near St. Loman's



Frances was in Maynooth and sent us some photos of Laraghbryan which is the site of an old monastic settlement, cemetery and ruined church and is located 1 kilometre west of the town. The ruined church consists of a nave and chancel with a tower attached. Most of the ruined structure was part of a church built in Norman times which, in turn, was built on the site of a previous ecclesiastical settlement.
