Knowing your Rights: Inheritance Rights of Unmarried Couples

My partner and I have two young children together. We live together but we are not married and haven't got around to making our wills. If something happened to one of us, would we automatically be entitled to each other's estate?

It is important for you and your partner to discuss the matter of inheritance sooner rather than later. Because you are not married, neither of you is automatically entitled to inherit anything from the other. If your partner dies without a will, you have no right to any share of their estate no matter how long you have been together. So, for example, if you live with your partner but they own the house, you could be left in very difficult circumstances if they were to die unexpectedly.

If you own items jointly, these automatically pass to you and are not part of your partner's estate. However, you might need to pay Capital Acquisitions Tax if the inheritance is above a certain threshold or value.

If your partner has not made a will or has not provided for you, you may be able to apply to the courts to provide for you from your partner's estate. This is known as the redress scheme for cohabiting couples. If you get redress by a court under this scheme, you may be exempt from paying Capital Acquisition Tax.

However, making a will can ensure that proper arrangements are made for you and your dependants and that any property is distributed in the way you both wish, subject to certain rights of spouses and children. Tax planning advice can help reduce or minimise the amount of tax your partner or family must pay. A solicitor can help you draft a will or you can draft one yourself.

On Friday last, 7th May, we had a most enjoyable morning with the 4th Year students of St. Joseph's College. These young aspiring environmental scientists, led by their teacher, Ms Michelle Dunne and supported by Ms Linda Ennis, walked up through Vesey Park, taking random samples of the water in the Griffeen River. They were participating, on behalf of Lucan Tidy Towns, in WaterBlitz 2021, a DCU organised event taking place from 7th - 10th May 2021 in conjunction with Earthwatch Europe.



Citizen scientists countrywide were asked to sample and test the water quality in their local river, lake, pond or stream for nitrates and phosphates, using kits supplied to them. This same event took place in a number of European cities, including London and Paris. The students tested the samples and later the results were uploaded and sent to Earthwatch Europe's FreshWater Watch website. The WaterBlitz Team at DCU coordinated the whole event, encouraging organisations to get involved. Our 4th Year students, on their own initiative, made a TicToc video of the event which was submitted to DCU. The WaterBlitz Team was so pleased with this that they awarded the students a special certificate. Well done girls!!

Monday, 10th, our second day of testing water was a little more sedate, with just ourselves, Tidy Towns volunteers involved. Nevertheless, a very interesting and healthy morning was spent testing

the quality of the water further upstream the River Griffeen.



Results to follow but looking reasonably healthy, in spite of obvious litter in places. Many thanks to all who participated.

Oral history project sheds light on the experiences of people under probation supervision in the Dublin region

The experiences of people confined to institutions such as prisons, mother and baby homes, Magdalene laundries and industrial schools, have received significant attention in recent years. However, the historical experiences of people under probation supervision in the community have been largely forgotten.

The *Histories of Probation* project, led by Dr Louise Kennefick (Maynooth University) and Dr Deirdre Healy (University College Dublin) aims to uncover and document people's experiences of probation supervision. The researchers would like to hear from anyone placed under probation supervision by the courts in the 1960s or 1970s, whether this was a probation order, community service order, suspended sentence or temporary release.

Dr Kennefick explains why this project is so important: "We believe that this project will provide a better understanding of the history of the Probation Service, which may help to improve policy and practice in the future. We would like to know what it was like to be under supervision during the 1960s and 1970s, whether those experiences were helpful, unhelpful or irrelevant to people's lives."

"We hope that people will be willing to come forward and share their stories with us. The more people who participate, the more useful the findings will be. While the Probation Service has expressed support for the project, it is important to say that the study is not being conducted by or on behalf of the Probation Service, which means that all information will be kept confidential."

During the first phase of the project, the researchers interviewed probation officers about their experiences of working during the 1960s and 1970s. Probation officers described their role at this time as being to 'advise, assist and befriend' clients and as having a strong community and vocational ethos. Probation officers also spoke about a lack of state-funded rehabilitation services, which impacted on their ability to help clients build better lives or move away from crime. To compensate, many innovated by introducing new programmes or drew on existing services in the community, including those provided by religious orders and voluntary lay organisations such as the Legion of Mary.

During the 1960s and 1970s, the Probation Service was a small and largely voluntary service

but has since evolved into a nationwide, professionalised organisation with a social work ethos. Today, probation officers play a crucial role throughout the criminal justice process; for example, providing pre-sanction reports to courts, supervising offenders in the community, and working with prisoners in custody and after release. In 2019, the Probation Service received 3,626 referrals from courts in the Dublin region. CSO statistics show that 30.8% of Dublin residents placed under supervision in 2016 were reconvicted within one year of completing a supervision order. "However, these figures cannot tell us whether probation supervision helped people to stop offending or how it impacted on their lives," Dr Kennefick said.

Maths: Ms. O' Neill's 3rd yr Maths class took to the school yard for an outdoor practical trigonometry class last Friday. The students brought in their homemade clinometers (a tool that is used to measure the angle of elevation in a right-angled triangle) which they made using a protractor, straw, string, a paper clip weight and sellotape, after viewing demonstrations on Utube as a guide. The students were put into socially distanced groups and tasked with measuring the height of any building (school/sports hall), wall, lamp post, basketball hoop etc on the school grounds and finding the elevation to the top of the object. They had to take into account their distance from the object/building and their own height before applying their trigonometric skills that they had learned in class.

The origins of Trigonometry lay in practical measurement tasks of finding unknown sides and angles, using right sided-angles, and the students fully embraced the challenge of discovering different angles that encouraged them look at familiar objects with fresh eyes.

The students thoroughly enjoyed getting out of the classroom into the beautiful, crisp air for a practical, hands-on trigonometry lesson and they all successfully completed their tasks. Ms. O' Neill was delighted with the students' co-operation, attentiveness and behaviour throughout the outdoor lesson, so much so that the students were not given any homework (which is a rarity for Ms. O' Neill!) as a reward.

Gaeilge: Our 3rd yr students completed their Tasc Cumarsáide (Communication task) Classroom Based Assessment this week. The students were tasked with selecting a topic of interest to them and researching information about the topic over a period of two weeks. They then had to do a live oral presentation in front of their classmates.

The students selected a wide variety of interesting topics for their presentation such as their favourite football club, hobbies, the GAA, local, national and international sport stars, famous figures from history, local area, an Ghaeltacht, music, school, family, pets and even the Queen of England! The students used Google Slides, photos, visual aids, props etc to engage the audience and the quality of spoken Irish was very impressive throughout.

A number of the students also used humour to great effect during their presentations and awareness of target audience is one of the key skills being assessed during these CBAs, along with language proficiency, voice projection and presentation skills.

Each student will be awarded one of four descriptors (Exceptional/Above expectations/In line with expectations/ Yet to meet expectations), which will appear on their Junior Cycle Profile of Achievement.



For the final few weeks of term, the 3rd yr Irish students will be preparing for an oral examination (Béaltriall) that will count for 20% of their final grade for their 3rd yr Junior Cycle report.

Assessments: Coláiste Phádraig's Entrance Assessment was held online on Saturday 8th May from 10am until 1pm. The 6th class students completed the assessment from home using computers, iPads, laptops and tablets. They were advised to use headphones and complete the tests in a quiet room, free from any distractions. All instructions were given via a voiceover that explained exactly what steps to take to complete the assessment correctly and in a timely manner. 1st yr classes in the school are all mixed-ability so the main purpose of the assessment is to identify students' strengths and also identify areas where they may need a little extra help and support in. We look forward to welcoming our 120 new 1st yrs into the school in September 2021.

Exams: Our 23 6th yr LCVP students sat their Link Modules Leaving Cert exam on Saturday from 10:00-12:30. The students had lots of choice in the exam which they were very pleased with and the feedback was overwhelmingly positive afterwards. The written exam is worth 40% of their overall marks with the remaining 60% going to their Portfolio of Coursework which has already been submitted.

15 of our 6th yr students also completed Written Proficiency assessments in various subjects such as Romanian, music etc on Saturday. The assessments were held to give the students an opportunity to provide evidence of their proficiency in the subject (as the students are not studying them as part of their regular school timetable and so have outside instructors/tutors such as family members preparing them for exams). The students can still sit the written exam in the subject in June so the purpose of the assessment was to ensure eligibility for an accredited grade.



St Joseph's College

Our 6th year LCVP students sat their exam last Saturday. LCVP (Leaving Certificate Vocational Programme) combines academic study with a focus on self-directed learning, enterprise, work and the community. It's great for the students to have one exam done!

Ms Lynn's TY class made beautiful bird feeders this week, as part of their biodiversity projects. The students made great use of our new outdoor benches. The finished bird feeders, made using paper rolls, peanut butter and bird seed, looked superb!
