Pope Leo X1V



A new Pope was heralded in recent days, announced firstly by the plume of awaited white smoke and then by declaration from the balcony in St Peter Square. The announcement was awaited by all worldwide, Catholics and people of other faiths and no faiths. Our new Pontiff chose the name Leo. Pope Leo XIII lived at the end of the 19th century into the 20th. He died in 1903. He was progressive in his thinking and alert to the gifts and challenges of industrialisation. Pope Leo XIII published the encyclical Rerum Novarum which was concerned about social justice with particular regard to the rights of workers, the right of people to own their own property and enterprises. Both socialism and capitalism were at large at that time and were strongly opposed by Pope Leo as being contrary to Gospel values.

The background of Pope Leo XVI mirrors the values of Pope Leo XIII in terms of having a strong voice against Marxist values in Peru, speaking for the rights of workers with no fear of the leaders

of the day. His feet were on the ground with those whom he served as an Augustinian priest. His feet were on the ground with his confreres internationally in his service as Superior General of the Augustinian Orders. As Superior General he would have travelled to most, if not all, of the places of mission and ministry in 47 countries providing him with a wonderful international bird's eye view of the church in action.

What has Pope Leo XIV said in these early days? In his address to his brother cardinals, he declared that he wished to continue the journey of the Second Vatican Council, unfolded evermore by Pope Francis with dialogue and discernment opening new chapters through lived faith experience and ongoing reflection. He is alert to the new stage of industrial influence in artificial intelligence, and as with Pope Leo XIII in his time, requiring that the dignity of the person and justice regarding labour never be disregarded in the striving towards capitalist endeavours.

Pope Leo speaks of the church as the womb from which we were born and the field with which we are charged to give care so that fruits may grow from sowing the seed of the Gospel values and living the sacramental life together. The word which I heard and read most frequently, so far, is TOGETHER!

Every single person matters in the community of the church and in the community of the world. Leave one person behind and the integrity of all is questionable. This screams in a world where we watch many suffer each day and see capitalism gaining ground like never before.

We have a leader with relevant vision, so let us move forward TOGETHER in mission!

Cross-Border Healthcare Directive

If you are entitled to public health services in Ireland, you may choose to access those services in another member state of the European Union (EU) or European Economic Area (EEA), which also includes Iceland, Liechtenstein and Norway, and be repaid the cost if you meet the requirements. This is provided for by the Cross-Border Healthcare Directive (EU Directive 2011/24/EU, pdf).

You will be repaid the cost of the public healthcare treatment in Ireland, or the cost of your treatment abroad, if that is less. It does not include other costs such as travel.

Treatments that qualify for the Treatment Abroad Scheme are not covered under the Cross-Border Healthcare Directive. The Treatment Abroad Scheme covers treatments that are not available in Ireland while the Cross-Border Healthcare Directive only covers treatments that are publicly funded and available in Ireland.

The rules for the Cross-Border Healthcare Directive include:

The treatment abroad can be in public or private healthcare.

Some types of treatment need to be authorised in advance.

You pay for the healthcare and then apply for a refund.

You need the same kind of referral for healthcare abroad as you would for healthcare in Ireland, for example, from a GP (family doctor) or hospital consultant.

Travel costs and living expenses abroad are not covered.

You can no longer use the Cross-Border Healthcare Directive to access healthcare in the UK.

The Northern Ireland Planned Healthcare Scheme is a temporary scheme that allows you to receive healthcare in Northern Ireland in a similar way to the Cross-Border Healthcare Directive. The healthcare must be publicly available in Ireland. You must pay for the healthcare and then claim the cost from the HSE.

The Scheme is available until a permanent statutory scheme is approved. Residents of Northern Ireland can access healthcare in Ireland under the Republic of Ireland Reimbursement Scheme.

If you have started your healthcare in the UK and began to receive that healthcare before 2021, you may still be able to apply for reimbursement under the Cross- Border Healthcare Directive.

In the case of some community-based services the appropriate referral could be by a Health Service Executive (HSE) professional such as a public health nurse, community dentist or HSE orthodontist.

The referral letter should specify the healthcare required, the health professional abroad you are being referred to and their clinic, hospital or other location. You, or the person referring you, should be satisfied that the healthcare provider abroad is qualified and suitable. If you wish to access information on services or service providers abroad please contact the National Contact Point for the other EU/EEA State.

Make sure that the service you are seeking to access abroad is covered by the Cross-Border Healthcare Directive. Your referring clinician can advise you about this but if you are in doubt you can contact the National Contact Point in Ireland to check.



CPR Award: We are delighted to announce that our school has been successful in the application for the prestigious CPR 4 Schools Heroes

Award, recognising the exceptional efforts of seven of our TY students, under the supervision, guidance and support of Ms. Smith and Mr. McGill, in promoting CPR awareness and training. This national award, presented by the Irish Heart Foundation, acknowledges individual students and teachers who go above and beyond in advocating for lifesaving skills.

Under the expert guidance of Ms. Smith, who is certified in CPR training, the students, Cian Kelly, Thomas Connolly, Leo Jordan, Faran Iftikhar, Eoghan Burke, Andrew McNally and Adam Donoghue embarked on a year-long journey to develop their lifesaving skills. Through a structured and supportive training programme, they gradually built their confidence and competence in performing CPR, culminating in their ability to teach and inspire their peers.

The TY students set up four CPR dummies in the school library, providing hands-on demonstrations and allowing their peers to practice CPR in a controlled environment. Their commitment to this cause exemplifies the core values of the CPR 4 Schools programme, which aims to create a generation of lifesavers by equipping young people with the skills to respond effectively in cardiac emergencies.

St. Mary's Camera Soirée

This week Donal was out west and sent us in photos of Connemara ponies asserting their authority over the local horses. The Connemara Breeders' Society runs an annual pony show and the Show in Clifden from 19th to 22nd August will mark 100 years of the show. Irene was in Lourdes and found mushrooms inside trees there





Brendan got a closeup shot of a bluetit taking grubs to the nestlings in his garden. The bluetit is one of Ireland's top 20 most widespread garden birds.

Brendan also submitted a beautiful still life photograph which I found very reminiscent still life painting from the golden age of Dutch painting in the 16th and 17th century.

Michael was in Bettystown and submitted a photo of the magnificent beech there at low tide. There has been racing on this beach since 1868. Up until 1995, racing was run at distances between five furlongs and two miles with a U-shaped turn at Bettystown where the horses made a sweeping return before heading back to the Laytown finish. The next meeting is on 4th September.





He also came across a poster for a dance in Kells back in November 1946. The admission charge was 5 shillings equal to about €15 today. The dance was held on "Holentide Night". As far as I can make out "Holentide" is a Manx version of

Halloween/All Saint's Day and marked the first day of winter and also the first day of the Celtic year. What it has to do with Kells I don't know!
