Sunday 19th May 2024 Benemerenti – Well deserved



Sunday last was a special day in St. Patricks. Archbishop Dermot Farrell celebrated the 12:00 noon Mass at which he presented the Papal Award 'Benemerenti' to Mrs. May Clifford.

The Benemerenti Medal (which translates as 'well deserved') is a medal awarded by the Pope to members of the clergy and laity for service to the Catholic Church.

May Clifford has been involved in the life of the church in Lucan since her childhood, and for the last 40 odd years has served as Sacristan at St. Patrick's. Her memories of the

church predate the establishment of St. Patricks, and include happy memories of her childhood and growing up in St. Mary's, the mother parish of Lucan. May recalls well the early days in the prefab that stood on the site of the present St. Patrick's Church, and she has been part of the developing parish through those many years.



In his words on Sunday, Archbishop Dermot acknowledged May's years of service to the parish and paid a fitting tribute to her. It was lovely to see May's proud family with her on Sunday, to see her celebrated in such a lovely way.

Thankfully the weather was kind to us last Sunday, and our tea and sandwiches were served on the lawn, by the hospitality group, who produced such a lovely spread. Thanks to all those who helped in providing the eats, which went down a treat.

Sunday's celebration, while personal to May, was also a powerful reminder of the importance of willing collaborators who are a vital part of our church. Congratulations to May, and thanks to the many people who bring life and vitality to our parishes.

Register of electors – updating your details

You can now update your details at any time during the year. The easiest way to do this is on checktheregister.ie



You must change your details at least 15 days before polling day. Sundays, public holidays and Good Friday are not counted as days for this purpose.

If you are already registered, you should check your details.

Tenants' rights in rented accommodation

Your landlord has a legal duty to make sure that rented accommodation meets specific minimum standards. These standards apply mainly to homes rented from private landlords, with exceptions for some types of tenancies.

What condition should the property be in?

Your landlord must maintain properties so they are free from damp, and structurally sound, internally and externally. Essential components such as roofs, windows, floors, heating systems and more, must be in good condition. Electricity and gas supplies should be safe and functional.

There must be adequate ventilation, lighting and heating controls in every room.

What appliances and facilities should my landlord provide?

Your landlord must provide access to essential appliances including:

A washing machine

A clothes-drver if the property does not have a private garden or yard A 4-ring hob with oven and grill A cooker hood or extractor fan A fridge and freezer, or a fridge-freezer

A microwave oven

All landlords must also provide:

Suitable and adequate storage cupboards for storing food and non-food items (for example, cleaning products).

Sink with mains water supply of cold drinking water, piped supply of hot water and draining area.

A separate room, for the exclusive use of each rented unit, with a toilet, a washbasin and a fixed bath or shower with hot and cold water. These facilities must be maintained in good working order and the room must be well ventilated.

A permanently fixed heater in each bathroom or shower room. These must be working well and be properly maintained.

A fixed heating appliance in each room, which provides enough heat for the room and can be controlled by the tenant.

A fire blanket and fire detection and alarm system.

Access to vermin-proof and pest-proof rubbish storage facilities. The landlord must also make efforts to prevent the infestation of pests and vermin at the property.

Safety restrictors on windows that are located above a certain height, to prevent falls. Information on the property, building services, appliances and their maintenance requirements. A carbon monoxide alarm which must be suitably located and maintained

What can I do if these minimum standards are not met?

You should always report sub-standard conditions to your landlord first. If your landlord fails to meet minimum standards, you can contact your local authority. Local authorities can issue Improvement Notices and Prohibition Notices, outlining necessary repairs and prohibiting reletting until compliance is achieved.
