I'm Sorry for Your Loss!

I never understood how it was OK to use the phrase *I'm sorry for your loss* until I experienced loss last year myself. Before this it seemed so banal and empty as a phrase and just a matter of uttering something on encountering people just bereaved. However, I now really value it as an expression as it doesn't intrude on one's feelings or experience. It's a phrase of acknowledgement. It doesn't jar in the way that *I know how your feeling* might, as feelings are as unique as the individual and circumstances concerned. Similarly, the question *Are you OK?* sits comfortably too, as it allows the bereaved person to either stop that particular part of the conversation or to elaborate.

This month of November is a stirring time for anyone who has ever experienced loss of a loved one through death. It is a time to recognise the need to stand on the threshold again glancing both ways towards memories and towards a way of being now. It is a time of communal reflection on life and death for those who are in this space and a time to hold one another with care. It may be a very difficult time for many if the death has left an irreplaceable wrenching gap or an aching pain that is very slow to ebb. It may also be a very challenging time if family dynamics pull people further apart rather than together. No assumptions can be made about the relationship between the departed and the individually bereaved.

The feelings and experiences of grief really are as individual as the person concerned. Kubler Ross and other psychological theorists have defined stages of grief. However, I don't believe that there is anything clinical about grief as, for some, there might be one or two dominating feelings or thoughts while others may have a whole myriad in no recognisable order at all. The circumstances of death play greatly on the experience of grief and the unfolding of feelings.

There may be obstructing factors to permitting feelings to surface, such as rushing into dealing with the needs of other vulnerable people in the family or a denial that one is entitled to claim one's own grief space. Some may have gone through grief long before the loved one died and crossed the threshold to almost never return without anything being right or wrong in this. Grief doesn't have a particular time of beginning or ending as the way of being without one's loved one/s evolves.

Every day we stand beside people who are grieving! In this month of November may we pray for, listen to, be with... those who carry the burden of loss, recent or otherwise. May we hold our departed loved ones fondly in our hearts as each of the departed made an imprint on our lives in some manner. May they rest in Peace!

Please note: Children aged 0-4 inclusive travel free on TFI services. Children aged 5 to 8 can now travel free on Transport for Ireland (TFI) services with a Child (5-8) TFI Leap Card.

What are voluntary social insurance contributions?

Paying social insurance can help you to qualify for social insurance payments, such as the State Pension (Contributory). If you are an employee Pay Related Social Insurance (PRSI) deductions are made from your earnings each week.

If you are no longer an employee or if you are self-employed and you are no longer making compulsory PRSI contributions, you can opt to make voluntary contributions. If you are getting a social welfare payment or signing for credits you may get credited contributions which will also keep your social insurance record up to date.

Voluntary contributions can help maintain your social insurance record and help you to qualify for social insurance payments in the future. They cover long-term benefits such as pensions. They do not cover short-term benefits for illness,

maternity, paternity, jobseekers, occupational injury or treatment benefit schemes. They also cannot be used to meet the PRSI rules for Invalidity Pension.

You can pay voluntary contributions if you:

Are no longer covered by compulsory PRSI in Ireland

Are no longer covered by PRSI on a compulsory or voluntary basis in another EU country Meet the age conditions – see below

Age conditions for paying voluntary contributions

You pay voluntary contributions if you are under 66.

You can also pay voluntary contributions if you are aged between 66 and 70, as long as you were born after 1 January 1958 and you do not get the State Pension (Contributory).

Working outside the EU

If you are working outside the EU and not subject to Irish or EU social insurance contributions, you may also opt to pay voluntary contributions.

Changes to PRSI requirements for voluntary contributors

Since 6 April 2015 you need 520 paid PRSI contributions (10 years) to be eligible to make voluntary contributions:

People who became voluntary contributors after 6 April 2014 and before 6 April 2015 needed 468 PRSI paid contributions (9 years)

People who became voluntary contributors after 6 April 2013 but before 6 April 2014 needed 364 PRSI paid contributions (7 years)

You can check whether you are eligible to make voluntary contributions on our website.

Rates

There are three rates of voluntary contributions. The rate of voluntary contribution you pay is linked to the last PRSI contribution paid or credited by you. More information is available about on our website or in the CIC office. paying social insurance.



- Detachment from sin: There must be no sin a soul is unwilling to renounce.




Weary of it all.....

Christmas shoe-box: This year's Team Hope Christmas Shoebox Appeal has been a truly heart-warming success story within our school community, showcasing the generosity, teamwork, and compassion that define our students. Thanks to the incredible effort and organisation of our ERST Student Committee, we collected a record-breaking total of 96 shoeboxes, each one carefully filled with toys, gifts, and surprises destined to bring joy to children in need this Christmas.

The Devil's Mill


"Luttrell's Mill" was once known as "The Devil's Mill". Legend has it that it was built in one night by the devil himself!



When Henry
Luttrell succeeded
to the estate
following the
Jacobite Wars, he
went from bad to
worse until it is
said the devil paid
him a visit one
night and made
him an offer for

his soul. Colonel Henry agreed to its sale, but stipulated tat he should not be called until he had enjoyed many years of wild life; and even then the devil should not claim his soul as long as he was able to set him an impossible task. This was agreed to.

After a reckless existence of some yeas, during which all the Colonel put his hand to seemed to turn to gold, the devil one night appeared, and told him his time was up. "Build me a mill by morning" said the Colonel, "on the boggawn below at the Liffey". To his amazement the startling information was brought to him in the morning, that a mill was standing on what was a snipe-bog the day before.

That night the devil again appeared and on this occasion the Colonel remarked he would sooner accompany him dead than alive, so would he kindly produce a rope of sand to throttle him with. The devil immediately complied and was tying a slip-noose on it when the Colonel, now at his wit's end to know how to escape, suddenly defied the devil to silence his wife's tongue. At the same moment a loud scream was heard to proceed from the adjoining room; and on the Colonel rushing in to see what was the cause of it, he was horrified to find his wife stretched lifeless on the floor. Stricken with a great remorse at what he had unintentionally brought about, the Colonel now begged for a three-days' respite in order to be present at this wife's wake and burial: to this the devil consented.

On the night of the funeral the devil returned and found Colonel Luttrell intently reading the Bible by the light of a single rush, which he was about to renew from a bundle beside him. In an agony of terror, he beseeched for a little more time to settle his worldly affairs, but the devil's patience was exhausted, and he refused.

Again, the colonel pleaded if only to see the light of one more day; but the devil would only allow him just such time as it would

take the almost exhausted to burn itself out. On hearing this the Colonel jumped up, seized the rush-holder, released the lighted rush, thrust it between the pages of the Bible, and banging down and clasping the cover extinguished the light.

With a roar of baffled rage at being outwitted, the devil disappeared from Luttrellstown, and never again troubled Colonel Luttrell, who from that night became an altered and repentant man.
