Cats and Cacti!

I re-potted some cacti that I have in my house two weeks ago, before the coldness of winter brought their growth to dormancy. I wanted to give the plants time to root comfortably in the bigger pots before halted by the cold. I am surprised, two weeks on, how much they have grown in that time as their growth is usually very slow! It looks like they are happy with the new space and new source of nourishment!

The same analogy may be applied to us and to all that we do. We sometimes wait for the space of a weekend away or some special time for refreshment to occur or go to inspiring seminars to gain a different perspective. However, the time or space needed to refresh or seek new ideas might be found in the small space in which we might be currently. Perhaps, we could adapt the attitude and cunning of a cat (I love cats!) where they can find opportunity in the tiniest of physical spaces and emerge, almost like magic, from the tightest of places, in which there was just the right space! It's about making that space at the right time as waiting might provide it too late for benefit.

Most people's lives are very busy. We complain about busyness, but is it not wonderful to have the ability to be busy and deal with it well, for the most part! Busyness is a response to the many opportunities available to us, our families and children. In the middle of the busyness, we can find and make that little space that can allow growth, ideas, fun and friendships to grow and be enjoyed. Sometimes taking five minutes in the right physical, mental or spiritual space can be just what is needed to have the energy to get on with the rest of the day or week. A five-minute walk down a

corridor or the same time away from technology is sometimes enough to find a suitably creative solution with which we can emerge like the cat. Working with what we have rather than longing for what we can't have right now is the more fertile territory.

Let's adopt the attitude of the cat and make the very best of the spaces that we have, to pop out in a new place in our heads and hearts, even if we are feeling as thorny as the cacti! The cactus, and cacti moments, are perfectly manageable when handled the right way!

FIREWORKS

Fireworks include items which burn and explode to produce noise or a visual effect for entertainment. Sparklers, bangers, fountains and rockets are all fireworks.

Most fireworks can only be bought and used by professional, licenced operators. Only the least dangerous fireworks can be sold to the general public.

Fireworks are dangerous. You need a licence to import them to Ireland and the way they are stored and sold is regulated by laws on explosives.

Categories of fireworks

Fireworks are divided into 4 categories. The least dangerous is Category F1 and the most dangerous is Category F4.

Category F1 fireworks

Category F1 fireworks can be bought and used by the general public. These are called very low hazard fireworks.

F1 fireworks:

Pose the least danger Make very little noise

Are for use in a limited space (including indoors) Examples include party poppers, ground spinners, Christmas crackers and some sparklers. Importers of these fireworks must have a licence (except for Christmas crackers).

Category F1 fireworks can be dangerous and their use should be supervised. F1 fireworks cannot be sold to anyone under the age of 12.

Bangers are not in Category F1 and it is illegal for the general public to import, possess or use them.

More dangerous fireworks

Fireworks in other categories are more dangerous and can only be used by professional operators in organised displays, not by the general public. These fireworks include rockets, roman candles and aerial wheels. If you want to organise a display of these types of fireworks, you must use a professional fireworks operator.

What are the penalties for having a firework?

Category F1 fireworks can be bought and used by the general public. Apart from Christmas crackers, a licence is needed to import F1 fireworks.

It is illegal to import, hold, sell or use any other fireworks without a licence.

It is an offence to:

Light an unlicensed firework
Throw a lit firework at a person or property,
except for low-hazard (F1) fireworks
Have an unlicensed firework
Have an unlicensed firework with the intention of
selling it or giving it to someone else
These offences are specified in Section 80 of the
Explosives Act 1875, as amended by the Section
68 of the Criminal Justice Act 2006.
These are arrestable offences. The Gardaí can
arrest you without a warrant if they suspect you of
having committed an offence under this Act (see

If you are found guilty of any of the above offences:

'Fireworks and Garda powers' below).

On summary conviction (in the District Court), you are liable to a class C fine or to a prison sentence of up to 6 months, or to both

On conviction on indictment (in the Circuit Court), you are liable to a maximum fine of €10,000 or to a prison sentence of up to 5 years, or to both



Our students are now immersing themselves in a very active TY programme and trying new experiences and learning new skills that they will take into senior cycle and future life. Transition Year: Our 74 TY students, accompanied by Mr. Keane, Mr. Dunne, Mr. Murtagh and Mr. O' Carroll, enjoyed an eventful and action-packed 2 days of activities in Carlingford Adventure Centre this week, always one of the highlights of the Transition Year Calendar. They set off at 11am on Monday 7th Oct with the excitement palpable on the bus! They arrived at the centre at lunchtime. The students had some lunch together in the centre canteen before splitting into two groups, with the 1st group heading out for their 1st set of activities at SkyPark, which is the largest aerial adventure Course in Ireland. Here they took part in "Ziptopia", a series of ziplines and obstacles high above the ground.

The 2nd group went Kayaking on Carlingford Lough, with fantastic views of Slieve Foy as well as the spectacular Mourne Mountains. 

For those uninitiated in parkrun challenges (yes it's a thing!), one of the more commons ones is called the parkrun alphabet. This means doing a parkrun whose name begins with every letter of the alphabet....except x as there's no parkrun whose name starts with x!!

Since 2013, I was happily plodding around doing parkruns in various spots while on holidays or away with friends with no regard whatsoever for what the name of the local parkruns were or what one I should do best for my alphabet. It remained in the ownership of the Parnell family until 1891.

At the last minute a photo came in from Irene of the ruins of the Franciscan Abbey, known as Grey

Abbey, in Kildare village. The abbey was founded in 1260 and was suppressed in 1539. Three abbeys in and around Kildare town were established in the 13th century. They were known as the Grey, the Black and the White Abbeys reflecting the colours of the habits worn by the monks.
