Light and Darkness! The Hallowed Evening!

This weekend, the clocks are turned back so that our evenings become dark earlier as we begin to slide from Autumn to Winter. At this time of the year in farming culture, we gather the last of the harvest and put it away to last through the winter until new growth comes. At Hallowe'en (the Hallowed Evening) we remember those who have departed from this life to enter into the new life with God.

Nature and the spiritual world have great symbolic expression in this part of the northern hemisphere where the image of light and darkness is very vivid. This time of the year involves a letting go. It also involves a remembering of our departed loved ones as we stand on the threshold of November. There may be both light and darkness in the remembering with a whole wide range of feelings and thoughts.

If we were to take Hallowe'en as a gathering of our harvest of experiences, of love, of our treasured friends and family members, of the hopes that gave us the momentum to keep going when life was tough, it might give us what we need to face whatever challenges will emerge in the next few months. What has grown in our lives since Springtime? What husks do we need to shake off before we move gently into winter time?

Lucan was once a small village in the countryside where the Hallowe'en experience of gatherings, dance, music and harvest sharing was the same as in rural Ireland. It is now different, as is every village and town. The difference is appropriate for the time. However, despite all the change in the world, the basic needs of every person has not changed. We need one another and need connection to bring us through the darkness and light of life. For those who find the time of winter darkness particularly difficult there is light to be found among us.

Lucan is alive with wonderful community and parish groups, always open to new membership. Each of the groups add to the sense of community and belonging, contributing towards its' building and sharing of ideas that make a difference. For every individual involved in all of the groups, members experience a local belonging and a knowing that they matter. While we cannot change the darkness of the natural season, except artificially, we can change the light that we bring into the lives of others or into our own lives by taking advantage of the gifts of our local community.

This Hallowe'en let us hold hope and light before us knowing that Spring will come and that even in experiences of challenge or loss, that some glimmer of light is offered to us. Let us stand tall and lift our eyes up to the stars of night and to people and beliefs that offer us hope.

Halloween - This Halloween, don't forget, only certain low-hazard fireworks can be bought and used by the general public. These include party poppers and some sparklers. It's illegal to import, hold, sell or use any other fireworks without a licence.

What is Waste Electrical and Electronic Equipment (WEEE)?

Anything that needs a battery or a power supply to work is considered electrical and electronic equipment (EEE).

It is important to dispose of anything that runs on electricity, or that contains electrical parts, responsibly to avoid damaging the environment.

Common electrical and electronic waste items include:

Large and small household appliances.
Information technology (IT) and telecommunications equipment,
Consumer equipment, such as TVs, stereo equipment, electric toothbrushes
Lighting equipment, such as fluorescent lamps
Electrical and electronic tools
Toys, leisure and sports equipment
Medical equipment systems (except implanted or infected products)
Monitoring and control instruments
Automatic dispensers

Batteries and accumulators

How can WEEE damage the environment?

The main risks to the environment from WEEE are the depletion of natural resources and the release of dangerous substances.

If we send electrical and electronic products to landfill sites instead of recycling them, we miss the opportunity to recover and reuse millions of tonnes of materials. If we recycle these materials, this means we need to extract less raw material to manufacture new products.

Some electronic equipment contains substances that are considered dangerous to the environment and human health if they aren't disposed of properly and may leak into the soil, water or air and can cause serious environmental damage

Where can I recycle WEEE?

Companies that produce electrical and electronic goods must cover the cost of collecting, treating, recovering and disposing of WEEE in an environmentally friendly way.

This means you can return your household WEEE free of charge, either to a shop when buying a replacement item, or to another authorised collection point, such as a local authority civic amenity site.

WEEE Ireland have an interactive map which can help you find the best place to go to recycle your WEEE. Mywaste.ie also have a similar interactive map which you can use.

WEEE should not be put in landfill sites because of the harmful substances it contains.

Retailers must take back your old electrical and electronic equipment in store for free on a one-for-one, like-for-like basis. This means the old product must be the same type or have the same purpose as the new item you are purchasing.

Retailers in large stores must accept your small appliances (less than 25 cm high) for recycling without insisting you buy anything.

You can return certain types of waste batteries at various shops for free, as well as any local authority civic amenity site.

Recycling Batteries

You can return used batteries free of charge at: Any local authority civic amenity site Any shop selling the same type of battery Recycling vapes and e-cigarettes Most vapes and e-cigarettes have batteries so they should not be put in your bin at home. Instead, you should bring them to a Blue Battery Box to be recycled or to the store where you bought it.



Deserted Promenade at Lucan Weir

Open Letter to the Lucan Newsletter
For the Attention of South Dublin County
Councillors

As both a Lucan resident and a member of Lucan Kayak Club, I wish to express my disappointment regarding the closure of Lucan Promenade during this year's Liffey Descent. Having been involved with the race for over twenty years — both as a participant and a former organiser — I know how much this event means to our community.

The Liffey Descent is Canoeing Ireland's flagship international canoe marathon, attracting paddlers and spectators from across Ireland and abroad. It is a challenging and spectacular race that showcases the River Liffey through Celbridge, Leixlip, Lucan, and beyond — and has long been a source of local pride.

Traditionally, the Lucan Promenade at Lucan Weir is one of the most popular viewing points, where families, friends, and locals gather to cheer on competitors. This year, however, the area was fenced off and silent — the result, it seems, of ongoing renovation works and concerns over antisocial behaviour.

While these issues may be genuine, the decision to block public access during such a major community event was deeply regrettable. Those who come to watch the Liffey Descent are not troublemakers; they are supporters who bring life, energy, and goodwill to our village each year.

The extended delay in completing the Promenade upgrade raises understandable frustration. More importantly, it represents a missed opportunity for Lucan tourism and local business. The Descent brings many visitors who support local cafés, shops, and services — offering valuable exposure and revenue. Restricting access undermines both community spirit and economic potential.

I urge **South Dublin County Council** to ensure the **Promenade is fully open and event-ready** for next year's Liffey Descent. This race is more than a sporting event; it's part of Lucan's cultural identity and a celebration of our connection to the river.

Let's ensure that Lucan can once again take its rightful place at the heart of this wonderful tradition.

Movie Marathon: Last Friday evening, the school's computer room was transformed into a galaxy far, far away as a large group of students gathered for an unforgettable Star Wars movie marathon. From Jedi knights and droid sidekicks to epic space battles, the event brought together fans for a thrilling night of adventure, popcorn, and late-night movie magic.

The marathon kicked off promptly at 7:00 p.m. in the computer room, which had been transformed into a cosy, cinema-style viewing space complete with comfy seating, dimmed lighting, and of course—plenty of popcorn and hotdogs!

The event featured a carefully curated line-up of films: Episodes I, II, III, followed by the fanfavourite standalone film Rogue One, and then continuing into the heart of the classic trilogy with Episodes IV, V, and VI. In total, that's over 14 hours of Jedi action, Sith scheming, and iconic moments from across the Star Wars universe.

Throughout the night, students enjoyed an array of treats and drinks, which kept energy levels high as the hours ticked by.

As the final credits rolled around 9:00 a.m., many students could be seen rubbing their eyes, wrapped in blankets, and clutching their last handfuls of popcorn!

The event raised a total of 550e for the Young Scientist and SciFest competitions.

Transition Year: Last week, our TY students enjoyed an action-packed and memorable three-day trip to Carlingford Adventure Centre, where they took part in a wide range of outdoor activities designed to challenge, inspire, and build team spirit.



Set against the stunning backdrop of the Cooley Mountains and Carlingford Lough, the adventure centre offered the perfect setting for the students to connect with nature and each other. Over the course of three days, the group engaged in a variety of high-energy and team-focused activities such as kayaking, laser-tag and zip-lining that

tested both physical endurance and group cooperation.

Throughout the trip, our TY students were a credit to the school. The Carlingford staff praised them for their excellent behaviour, cooperation, and enthusiastic participation in all activities.

6th **yr news**: Our 6th yr students were treated to an engaging and informative talk last week from two representatives of the 7th Infantry Battalion, based at Cathal Brugha Barracks. The visit proved to be both eye-opening and inspiring, offering students a unique glimpse into life in the Irish Defence Forces and the wide range of opportunities it can provide.

Geography: Last Thursday, 40 of our 6th yr students from Mr. Rafter's and Mr. Tarpey's Geography classes swapped their classroom for the scenic surroundings of Glendalough, where they took part in an important Geography field study. This hands-on investigation forms a key part of their Leaving Certificate coursework, accounting for 20% of their final grade.



The aim of the day was to gather evidence of fluvial processes — in particular, erosion — by taking a series of measurements and observations along a stretch of the river. This included determining the river's depth and velocity at various points, which would help the students assess how the river changes from source to mouth. Equipped with wellies, ranging poles, flow meters, and notebooks, the students split into groups and got to work.

The students worked collaboratively to ensure accurate measurements, and there was plenty of lively discussion (and the occasional splash!) as they interpreted what they were seeing on the ground.

The next step for the students is to compile their findings into a formal report, which will be submitted to the State Examinations Commission.

Update on Healthcare Services for the Lucan
Area:

Following last week's visit to the new Adamstown Primary Care Centre a project I have long advocated and campaigned for I'm pleased to share further progress for healthcare in our community.

At this week's Regional Health Forum meeting I again raised the urgent need for an additional Primary Care Centre for the Lucan area. With Lucan's population now more than three times that of areas in Dublin already served by such centres this has become a pressing issue. The HSE confirmed they are aware of the growing demand and are in discussions to identify suitable land in Lucan for a future Primary Care Centre. They also agreed to attend a future Area Committee Meeting to discuss healthcare services locally and hear the issues raised by residents.
