Hallowe'en: Hallowed Evening

The word hallowed is at the core of the word Hallowe'en – the Holy Evening! It is on the threshold of November when we remember those who have died and celebrate our saints. It gives reverence to a particular time during the year when the light wanes and the harvest has been gathered in nature and in life. It acknowledges the sacredness of life and of death along with acceptance of the mystery of death which has place at the core of all religions and belief systems. We have no choice regarding the seasons or of when life ends. However, we do have some choice (usually) with regard to how we live the seasons of life, including the season of death.

The macabre decorations which seem to grow out of front gardens of skeletons, skulls, fake dismembered limbs and other ghoulish objects and images scream against what is precious about having a healthy, intact human body and respect for all regarding death. There is a resistance by many to allow children to attend funerals and be exposed to the reality that death is part of life and yet the images of meaningless decay and darkness abounds in the homes and public environment throughout the month of October.

The Christian belief regarding death is that life is not ended, but is changed. Those who die close the door on our world to move into the brightness, hope and glory of the next life. The ghostly world has always been fascinating in most cultures but it is rather sad that we have moved so far away from the funny Casper the Ghost-like character to ghostly images along with hacked and bloodied body parts of the scariest form. We lean on the commercial products mindlessly as we seek to entertain ourselves and make sense of this season of moving from the light of summer to the darkness of winter!

As we deal with the dark sky of winter black humour has always had a place in Irish culture as we see in the story telling of times past as a way of living with the dormancy of winter. However, it was balanced with a deep respect for all that was living and dead. Does anyone really think that their neighbours get joy from seeing a skeleton crawling out of the ground of the garden? What might this be like for those whose loved ones have died recently?!

In any concept, life is precious and sacred. The human body, mind and spirit is fragile and precious – sometimes only realised when illness befalls us! Death is a sacred moment of entry into new life deserving reverence in all aspects. As the darkest of night skies present a background that lets the gleaming light of the stars take prominence, let our chosen imagery of Hallowe'en do the same leading towards hope and not despair!

Freedom of Information to access your medical information

Your medical records are your personal records You have an individual right of access to your personal records held by the Freedom of Information Act 2014 (FOI Act).

Public bodies the FOI Act applies to include:

The Health Service Executive (HSE), Voluntary hospitals, Some health agencies, GP records. You can check this list of public bodies covered by FOL

If you are a medical card holder, you can use FOI to get medical records from records held by your GP.

You cannot use FOI for medical records from a private hospital or from your GP if you visit them as a private patient. Some public bodies are exempt from Freedom of Information.

How to access my medical records using **Freedom of Information**

If you want to access records under the FOI Act, you should apply to the public body that holds them.

If you have a medical card, the HSE holds the records of medical card holders.

If the head of the public body believes that giving you the information may be harmful to your health or emotional well-being, they can instead

give the medical records to a health professional that you choose.

If you have a dispute about access to records under the FOI Act, you should contact the Office of the Information Commissioner.

Open disclosure and your right to patient safety information

If certain serious patient safety incidents happen during your care, you and your family must be told by the healthcare body. This is known as the mandatory open disclosure policy and was introduced by the Patient Safety (Notifiable Incidents and Open Disclosure) Act 2023 on 26 September 2024.

The act contains a list of the specific patient safety incidents you must be told about such as serious injury or death.

Your right to patient safety information applies to private and public health providers. These include:

The HSE, Private Hospitals, Private health and social care providers such as GPs, Dentists and Pharmacists, Other HSE funded organisations. They must also notify the appropriate regulatory body such as the Health Information and Quality Authority (HIQA), or the Mental Health Commission (MHC).

Right to request a review of cancer screening results

You must be told before or at the time of the cancer screening of your right to request a review of your screening results completed by the HSE's National Screening Service.

You also have the right to be told the outcome of this review.

This is known as a Part 5 review and is part of the HSE open disclosure policy. Read more about open disclosure and patient safety on the HSE website.

Storm Ashley

The Humanitarian Assistance Scheme provides emergency financial assistance to households if you cannot meet the costs for essential needs immediately after severe weather events such as flooding.

The scheme covers

Emergency income support payments such as food, clothing and personal items Damage to your home and essential contents, such as carpets, flooring, furniture, household appliances and bedding Structural damage Income limits apply Information on our website.

Once collected, the spectacles are boxed & dispatched via DPD sponsorship to Lions Club de France in Le Havre. On arrival, they are sorted & cleaned. Using specialised equipment, the power of the lenses is measured for the new owner.

They are then shipped to a country in the 3rd World, to restore sight to lifeless eyes. 



LUCAN HARRIERS A.C. Galway Bay 10k and Half Marathon October 5th

Every adventure needs a beginning, and for the Lucan Harriers it began, with most of us leaving Dublin as the sun rose in the east, we headed west. Run Galway Bay had called, and we answered! Almost 30 hardy Lucan Harriers dared the trip to Galway, with Storm Kirk looming on the horizon, we left the calm of Dublin and battled our way to Galway. The first brave souls, our intrepid support crew made up of Ceara, Fanchea, Niamh and Lorraine, made their way to University of Galway Parkrun and headed on a beautiful 5km. Where they completed two loops of the meadow to start, then turn right onto the riverside pathway for an out-and-back. Finish with one final loop of the meadow.
