Let us reflect on how our own harvest.....

When I was growing up in Navan Road parish, there were four full time priests who were kept busy with all kinds of different parish work and sacramental duties. I think we can safely say that these times are very unlikely to return in the foreseeable future. Parish Partnerships are the new reality as we try to collaborate in order to share the gospel message more effectively.

You may think that you need to be a bishop or a priest to make a difference to the church. But history shows us that this is not always the case. Of the three great patron saints of Europe, who renewed the church at different times of crisis, St Benedict, St Francis of Assisi and St Catherine of Siena, none of them were ordained as bishops or priests. St Benedict was a monk, St Francis of Assisi was a Deacon and St Catherine of Siena was a layperson and a member of the third order of the Dominicans.

Faith can often be found in unexpected places and amongst people who might surprise us. In the Gospel reading, Jesus was astonished at the faith of the Roman centurion who had asked for healing for his servant. We are told that Jesus was amazed by his faith and said, "Not even in Israel have I found faith like this." We too can be amazed by the faith of others especially when we come across it out of the blue and where it might be least expected.

Pope Francis has said that it is in the peripheries that we encounter Jesus. We will never encounter Jesus if we live isolated in our own security and comfort. The more we reach out to other people in need, the more we realise that Jesus is there.



As we enjoy the beautiful, vibrant colours of the Autumn leaves, let us reflect on how our own harvest of faith can be more fruitful as we share our gifts and talents with our parish community and especially with those who are most in need.

PRSI - Pay Related Social Insurance

There are 11 different social insurance classes in Ireland. They are as follows:

Class A applies to people in industrial, commercial and service type employment who are employed under a contract of service with a reckonable pay of \in 38 or more per week from employment. It also includes civil and public servants recruited from 6 April 1995. In fact, most employees in Ireland pay PRSI Class A. People on CE schemes pay a special contribution at Class A8/A9.

Class J applies to people earning less than €38 per week. However, people aged over 66 or people in subsidiary employment are always insurable at Class J, no matter how much they earn. Subsidiary employment for Class J is for example, people who are insurable at Class B, C, D or H in their main employment. Only Occupational Injuries Benefit is covered by Class J social insurance.

Class E applies to ministers of religion employed by the Church of Ireland Representative Body. It covers all social insurance payments except Jobseeker's Benefit and Occupational Injuries Benefit.

Class B applies to civil servants and Gardaí recruited before 6 April 1995, and registered

doctors and dentists employed in the Civil Service. It covers only a limited number of social insurance payments.

Class C applies to commissioned Army Officers and members of the Army Nursing service recruited before 6 April 1995. It covers only a limited number of social insurance benefits.

Class D applies to permanent and pensionable employees in the public service other than those mentioned in Classes B and C recruited before 6 April 1995. It covers only a limited number of social insurance payments.

Class H applies to NCOs and enlisted personnel of the Defence Forces. It covers all social insurance payments except Occupational Injuries Benefit.

Class K applies to public office holders with an income of over \notin 5,200 a year. Public office holders with weekly income of \notin 100 or less are recorded under Class M. Class K also applies to people who pay PRSI on unearned income. There are no social insurance payments for people insured under Class K.

Class M applies to employees with no liability to contribute to social insurance such as employees under 16 years of age and people with an income of €500 or less and insured in Class K. Class M covers certain contributors with Occupational Injuries Benefit.

Class S applies to self-employed people including certain company directors, people in business on their own account and people with income from investments and rents. It covers a limited number of social insurance payments.

Class P applies to sharefishermen or sharefisherwomen who are classified as selfemployed and who are already paying PRSI under Class S. It covers them for limited Jobseeker's Benefit, limited Illness Benefit and Treatment Benefit.

If there is a problem in deciding what class of social insurance you should pay, the Scope Section in the DSP *may decide the issue after examining your employment situation.

<u>All varieties</u>, condition and sizes are very welcome – adults, children's, sunglasses, damaged/broken – we can use them all. No need to include glasses cases, as these are not required.

Once collected, the spectacles are boxed & dispatched via DPD sponsorship to MEDICO LIONS CLUBS de FRANCE in Le Havre. On arrival, the spectacles are sorted & cleaned. Using specialised equipment, the power of the lenses is measured for the new owner. They are labelled and packed ready for shipment to a country in Africa, Asia, South America ... and Europe, to restore sight to lifeless eyes.


Each delivery relies on our international network of LIONS CLUBS, and our partners who ensure they arrive at their destination safely, thus avoiding losses. The imperfect glasses are dismantled and the component parts are sold to reputable & trusted companies. The money raised help to fund the operation.



Coláiste Phádraig CBS

Open Night 2023: A reminder that Coláiste Phádraig's Open Night will take place in the school on **Thursday 5th October** from **7pm-9pm**.

Hurling: Our Senior Hurlers began their Post-Primary Schools Leinster Hurling "B" League campaign last Thursday with an exciting and high-scoring draw against Laois school St. Fergal's College, Rathdowney. Dublin Minor star Conor Dillon had a superb game in the fullforward line as he tormented the Laois backline throughout with his power, pace, intelligence and movement. Conor scored an impressive 2-09 in an influential display full of energy and skill. Michael O' Brien also scored a fine goal from the full-forward position with Seán Teehan, Patrick Ryan and Callum Morris adding further goals.

Killian Costello also impressed for Lucan in the half-forward line with his strength in the air, numerous interceptions and successful tackles. He also added 2 points from play but the last point came from the Laois side who equalised right at the end with their 25th score of the game to deny Lucan the win their overall performance perhaps merited. The final score was 6-15 to 4-21 so both teams can be a little disappointed not to win a game after posting such impressive scores. Lucan can be proud of their display as they had a much younger team than their experienced and talented opponents who had mainly 6th yrs playing for them.

There is one other team in the group, Coláiste Abhainn Rí, Callan, Kilkenny, with both teams to face them in the coming weeks. The group could very well come down to scoring difference after this opening draw so there could be some further high scores in store in the games ahead! The top team in the group advances to the League Final with the 2nd placed team qualifying for the Shield Final.

Football: Our senior football team began their Leinster League campaign on Monday with a group stage match against Coláiste De Lacy, Ashbourne. Lucan played very well against a high standard opponent but came up short on the day as the Ashbourne team eventually won the match on a score-line of 4:13 to 3:07. Full forward Tyler Doherty scored 2-0, Shane Wallace added 1-1 from full-back while Luke McGovern, who impressed throughout with a lively and influential display, kicked three points, while Reece Kelly, Alex Leonard and Kai Keogh scored the other points for the team. Two quick-fire goals just before half-time, while playing with a strong breeze, ultimately cost Lucan dearly.

Phelim Dunne was one of the team's stand-out performers as he won numerous high balls, tackled extremely well and used the ball intelligently throughout while Alex Leonard also impressed with his fitness, speed and handling. The team have one more group match to play, a must-win home game against a school from Ballymahon, Longford in the next two weeks.

Basketball: Our u16 and u19

basketball teams are to begin their Eastern League A campaigns this week after the draws were sent to schools last Thursday. Doubling up is the norm in schools' basketball with both panels travelling together for all matches against the same



opponents. They are approximately 20 schools in total in each competition and our teams have been drawn in a group of 5, alongside Coláiste Chiaráin, Leixlip, Adamstown CS, Moyle Park and Coláiste Éanna, Rathfarnham with the top two sides in each of the four groups of five advancing to the 1-4 finals. Our 16s contains the majority of the 2nd yr panel that won the All-Ireland "B" National Cup in dramatic fashion in May, with a couple of additional players from TY joining the group this yr.

The group will be managed by Ms. Gough and Mr. Kelly and they are both hopeful of another competitive and successful season, even though the step-up to "A" inevitably means that the standard of opposition will be much tougher this year. However, our u14s won every match they played last year so they are certainly up for the challenge! They can also take inspiration from our 2016 basketball team who won the u16A National Cup so it is not uncharted territory for the school.

Our u19s should also be competitive as our u16s won the Shield Final last year and won all of their games throughout the campaign, just missing out on a place in the main League semi-final due to a missed deadline in one fixture. The two panels had a good training session on Tuesday morning in preparation for their opening matches against Coláiste Éanna on Wednesday.

Soccer: Our senior soccer team have been drawn to play Malahide CS at home in the preliminary



round of the Leinster Senior Cup. There are 115 entrants for this year's competition, the highest amount in over 20yrs, so it is an extremely difficult competition to win. The match against Malahide will take place next week so best of luck to the team.

New Traffic Proposals for Dublin City Centre



Another major disappointment with the new traffic proposals for Dublin city centre. This is

The castle has been in ruins since the 18th century.
